The Golden Plains Middle School A-team girls' basketball team placed runner-up at the WKLL League Tournament on February 12, in Brewster. The girls finished their season with a 10-4 record.

The tournament began on Thursday, February 10, as the Lady Bulldogs took on Heartland Christian at the Colby Event Center. The Bulldogs had a slow first half as they went into half time with a slight lead 8-6. Picking up their energy after the half, the Dogs found their way to the basket, scoring 9 points right off the bat. They played tough defense, keeping

the Crusaders scoreless. Going into the final quarter with a 17-6 lead, the Bulldogs finished the job scoring 10 more points while only allowing the Crusaders to add 4. The Bulldogs claimed the 27-10 win to advance to the semi-finals held in Brewster on Saturday, February 12. Points were scored by Braylee Knowles 12, Kadeline Unrein 6, Anais Cepeda 5, Kailee Wessel 2, and Brenlynn Rath 2.

To start the day on Saturday, the Lady Bulldogs took on the Wheatland/Grinnell Thunderhawks in the semi-final round of the

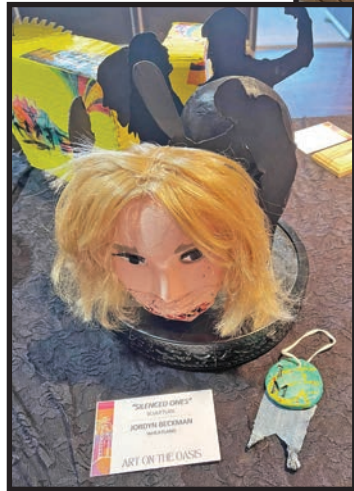
Art Students Win Awards on the Oasis

DSNWK Receives Grant from The Pete Henry Foundation

Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas, Inc. was recently announced as the recipient of a \$3,873.00 grant from The Pete Henry Foundation. This grant award will be used to create a storm shelter at DSNWK's developmental center at 733 9th Street in Hoxie.

A storm shelter is critical to the safety of people at the Hoxie Developmental Center in case of severe weather that could threaten the primary structure and well-being of both those individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) we serve and the staff who support them. In past years, the facility in Hoxie has experienced severe storm damage from high winds, indicating a serious need for this shelter.

The storm shelter is the final piece of a special renovation project for the Center. This renovation project was able to create a more functional, accessible, and community focused location to serve those with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) in Sheridan County and the surrounding area.

This developmental center, which was built in 1972 and opened by DSNWK in 1995, is home to DSNWK's College for Living program. The College for Living provides structured learning opportunities for individuals on life skills and opportunities to participate in classes and subjects that interest them.

DSNWK is a 501c3 nonprofit organization serving 18 counties in northwest Kansas with a mission to advocate for persons with disabilities and those who care about them by planning and supporting a life of dignity, interdependence, and personal satisfaction in the community.

The Geneva, Neb., Arts Council, wrote: “The characters in ‘Far As The Eye Can See’ were heartbreaking in the sense of the hardships they endured, but uplifting and inspiring in the strength and resiliency shown. It gave us a new appreciation of what our grandparents and their parents had to overcome.”

The Sheridan County Community Foundation awarded five Dane G. Hansen Community Fund grants totaling \$28,308.93 during the February and March cycles.

In February, the Main Street Arts Council received \$5,000.00 to assist with their production of “Honk Jr” to be held this summer in Hoxie as past of their regional Main Street Summer Theater Festival.

Hoxie Community Schools USD 412 received two grants in March: \$1,526.00 to help with the 5th and 6th Grade Field Trip to Smokey Hills Adventure Program located on the campus of Fort Hays State University, Hays, and \$10,000.00 to assist with the school’s daycare project in which they are applying to the Dane G. Hansen Foundation to acquire a modular unit to be placed in Hoxie that will house a daycare business managed by the school.

The foundation awarded a grant in the amount of \$1,782.93 to Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas Inc. for the purchase of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) at the Hoxie location.

An additional \$10,000.00 have been awarded to the foundation itself as part of the Childcare Duplex Project in which the foundation plans to construct a duplex facility and rent the units to new, private childcare providers in an effort to help address the current and ongoing childcare needs of Sheridan County.

SCCF reminds organizations to submit applications to www.growsheridancounty.org/grants for funding consideration by the last day of each month (rolling deadline).

Six categories are considered with making grants.

- **Education:** Enhances the learning environment and expands opportunities for students. Provides increased self-reliance on personal life skills and workforce capability.
- **Health Care:** Ensures access to quality health care services and promotes healthy life practices.
- **Community Social Services & Security:** Enhance access to social services needed for individuals of special needs and supports systems to provide community disaster relief and general community emergencies.

Foundation Awards Grants in February and March

- **Conservation & Environment:** Support efforts to improve and maintain high air and water quality, appreciation for our natural environment and enhances economic and social benefits of outdoor resources.
- **Arts & Culture:** Provide cultural and artistic opportunities to enhance the quality of life for residents and to encourage tourism and the exchange of ideas.
- **Community Beautification:** Support efforts to improve and maintain public spaces to enhance community pride and encourage socialization among residents.

**The Hoxie Democrat
Friday, March 16, 1888**

He is here, the boss dentist and tooth extractor, until Monday night.

Two little fisticuffs on the street this week. No damage was done and few jewels were reset.

Prairie fires all around the town last Tuesday. Look to your fire guards and see that they are in good order.

Call at the Ellithorpe hotel and have your teeth examined free of charge until Monday night.

G. W. Crane was in Oberlin Monday.
Wm. Gesford spent last Sunday in Oberlin.
W. F. Schultheis is east on a business trip.
Dr. Hebbard, of Grainfield, registered at the Commercial last Monday.

Messrs. Dean and Gates were registered at the Ellithorpe house last Monday.

Mrs. H. H. Wright left last Tuesday for New Mexico where she goes to visit her daughter, Mrs. Jeans.

Mr. V. Boller and wife left last Monday for Colorado where Mr. B. has a timber claim and pre-emption.

E. H. Lupton, J. R. Reed, R. L. Chambers and E. E. Moser made a flying trip to Colby last Sabbath. Uncle Billy Hausafus says it is one disappointment after another in this country. He says we will get a railroad this time sure.

King William, of Germany, died last week and great mourning is now going on in Germany. He was nearly ninety-one years of age.

New College of Education Program
Helps with Career Change

Kansas State University's Master of Arts in teaching program for secondary education, a pathway to teaching for career-changers in Kansas, has received approval from the Kansas State Board of Education. This approval allows Kansas schools to hire qualified candidates in the program to serve as teachers of record on a restricted license while they earn their master's degree and recommendation for an initial teaching license.

The 18-month residency program is based on K-State's successful 11-month Master of Arts in teaching program, ranked No. 17 by U.S. News & World Report.

Tom Vontz, a professor of curriculum and instruction and director of the College of Education's Master of Arts in teaching program, says the secondary education residency program helps the state with its teacher shortage by providing working adults with the resources and the opportunities to pursue their passion for teaching while getting the education they need.

Students admitted to the program begin their teaching careers on a restricted license while completing the requirements for a teaching certificate and master's degree. All students will participate in an intensive weeklong professional development experience to help prepare them for their teaching residencies. During their residencies, students are mentored by staff in local schools and veteran teachers who serve as university supervisors.

Todd Goodson, professor and chair of the College of Education's curriculum and instruction department, said that an elementary residency program is under review that also will provide the support, guidance, and structure to help accommodate a successful transition to teaching for busy working adults.

Applications Open for
Community Service Tax Credit
Program

Governor Laura Kelly announced that applications are currently being accepted for the Community Service Tax Credit Program (CSP). CSP provides an opportunity for private, nonprofit organizations and public health care entities to improve their ability to undertake major capital campaigns for projects involving children and family services, non-governmental crime prevention, youth apprenticeship and youth technical training and health care.

"The Community Service Tax Credit program is an incredible opportunity for nonprofit organizations to create lasting, meaningful changes for people across Kansas," said Governor Laura Kelly. "These tax credits will foster local solutions to local challenges, and they will help improve the quality of life for Kansans now and into the future."

Under this program, the state authorizes nonprofit organizations to offer tax credits to donors making contributions towards approved projects. Proposed projects should be unique or one-time in nature and create a lasting value for charitable organizations. For example, projects might include a capital campaign, major equipment purchase, major renovation, capacity building, etc.

Since 2019, CSP has earmarked \$1 million for childcare and early childhood development projects for services to those under the age of 5.

"These tax credits help local nonprofit and healthcare organizations streamline their fundraising efforts, to more effectively improve the health and economic wellbeing of Kansas communities," Lieutenant Governor and Commerce Secretary David Toland said. "We're asking Kansans to tell us about their initiatives, and if they are a good fit for the CSP program, we will provide a significant resource to help bring these projects to fruition across Kansas."

Applicants may request up to \$200,000 in tax credits. Applicant organizations in rural areas (less than 15,000 population) are eligible for a 70 percent credit. Applicant organizations in non-rural areas are eligible for a 50 percent credit. The application window is open through April 30, 2022, at kansascommerce.gov/csp.
