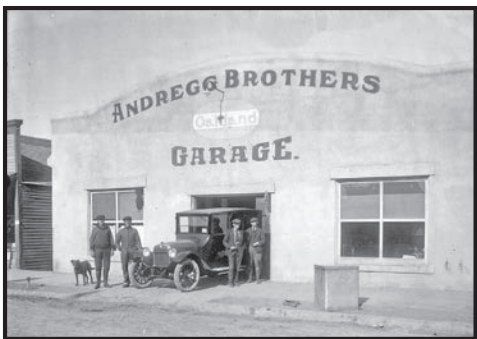

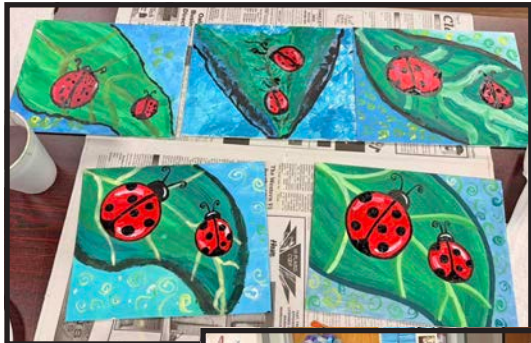

Kansans Soundly Defeat

Latest Constitutional Amendment

Lawrence, KS — On Tuesday, August 4, Kansas voters resoundingly defeated Kris Kobach’s proposed constitutional amendment, upholding Kansas’ fair and impartial state Supreme Court. Kobach spearheaded the fight for this amendment after Kansans overwhelmingly rejected his 2022 attempt to restrict abortion rights in the state.

Shortly after the failure of his 2022 amendment, Kobach told a crowd in Wichita that by changing the way Kansas selects its state Supreme Court justices, he could “slowly and quietly” place judges on the bench who would do his bidding.

“Kansans have once again soundly defeated a Kris Kobach-backed constitutional amendment. I am proud of the work that Kansans in every corner of the state have done to defeat this amendment and maintain our fair and impartial courts,” said Chris Mann, candidate for Kansas Attorney General. “Kansans have once again proven that when we come together, we win.”

Mann has been running for Kansas Attorney General since July 2025, garnering grassroots support across the state and raising more than four times as much as Kobach in 2026, according to recent campaign finance filings. Mann’s campaign is focused on bringing Kansans across the political spectrum together to return a focus on public safety to the Attorney General’s office.

“This campaign has been building momentum across the state, and we’re ready to build on tonight’s energy to deliver a sound defeat of Kris Kobach in November as well,” said Mann.

Kobach Court Win Ends

Registration of Firearm Suppressors

Topeka - Kansas Attorney General Kris Kobach today announced victory in a case where he defended the right of Kansans to acquire and own firearms.

“Today, the state of Kansas and our fellow plaintiffs won a great victory against the U.S. Department of Justice, which had been wrongly defending an unconstitutional law. The federal government has no right to demand that American citizens ask for permission before putting an accessory on their firearm to protect their hearing,” Kobach said.

A district court in the Northern District of Texas has enjoined the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms & Explosives (ATF) from enforcing registration, reporting and recordkeeping requirements that applied to suppressors and short-barreled rifles and shotguns.

Kansas and 14 other states joined a group of private plaintiffs to challenge these unconstitutional requirements in federal court.

“Our Constitution provides for a government of limited powers at the federal level. We must always be vigilant to enforce those constitutional limits, especially when government overreach threatens the right of Americans to keep and bear arms,” Kobach said.

Under the National Firearms Act of 1934, onerous registration requirements for covered firearms were paired with a tax on making and transferring them. Last year, Congress enacted the One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBA) and removed the tax on suppressors and short-barreled firearms. Without the tax, Congress lost its constitutional authority to impose the registration requirements. The regulatory provisions have been enjoined as unconstitutional because they now exceed Congress’s enumerated powers.

The court’s injunction prohibits ATF from enforcing the NFA registration requirements against Kansas gun owners. As a result, Kansans will soon be able to purchase the covered firearms without the burdensome and unnecessary registration requirements that restricted Kansans from exercising their Second Amendment rights.

In addition to Kansas, attorneys general from Texas, Alaska, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Louisiana, Montana, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Utah, West Virginia, and Wyoming joined the case.

In December 2025, Kobach also led 21 states in urging another federal district court to find federal registration requirements for untaxed firearms to be unconstitutional. The case is *Brown v. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives*, No. 4:25-cv-01162 (E.D. Mo.).

Kansas Court Permanently Blocks

Multiple Abortion Restrictions

Kansas court strikes down burdensome restrictions, including a so-called medication abortion “reversal” law. A Kansas state court permanently struck down a litany of abortion restrictions designed to make it harder to provide and access care. The court ruled that the laws violate the fundamental right to abortion as well as health care providers’ right to free speech under the state constitution. These restrictions, most of which have been temporarily blocked since October 2023, delayed access to time-sensitive care, jeopardized patients’ privacy, and forced providers to give patients false and potentially dangerous information, which could threaten their health. Today’s decision will help ensure that abortion remains protected and accessible in Kansas, where, in 2022, residents overwhelmingly voted to protect the state’s constitutional right to abortion.

In its decision, the court ruled that the challenged laws violate the state’s constitutional right to abortion, stating: “These draconian processes, which have ‘ballooned’ over time and exist in no other articulated healthcare context in Kansas, have resulted in emotional trauma and stress for plaintiffs, their staff, and their patients, and it causes delays and/or denials of care when the precise logistics and requirements are not explicitly followed.”

The laws struck down today, some of which date back to 1997, include:

- A requirement that all patients are given inaccurate and stigmatizing misinformation before they can receive abortion care.
- Burdensome and unnecessary requirements that certain state-mandated disclosures be received by patients in printed form, in specific typeface, font size, and color, at least 24 hours in advance of an abortion, delaying—and in some instances denying—access to time-sensitive health care.
- A law requiring providers to relay to patients at least five times that a medication abortion can be “reversed”—a false, and potentially dangerous, claim unsupported by scientific evidence.
- A medically unnecessary restriction forcing patients to wait an additional 30 minutes after meeting with their abortion provider before they may receive an abortion.
- A law forcing providers to interrogate their patients’ reasons for seeking abortion and report those reasons to the state, jeopardizing patients’ privacy.

Kansas politicians have continued to try to undermine abortion access at the state and federal levels, including by joining a separate case that aims to make it much harder to get medication abortion nationwide.

This case was filed by the Center for Reproductive Rights, Planned Parenthood Federation of America, Hunter Law Group, and Teresa Woody on behalf of plaintiffs Hodes & Nausser, M.D.s, P.A.; Traci Lynn Nausser, M.D.; Tristan Fowler, D.O.; and Comprehensive Health of Planned Parenthood Great Plains.

Kansas Wetlands Education Center Hosts Perseid Meteor Shower Watch Party

Hays - The Kansas Wetlands Education Center (KWEC) invites the public to join its staff for a free, family-friendly Perseid meteor shower watch party on Friday, Aug. 14, from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m.

This annual event celebrates the end of summer as the Earth passes through the dust and debris of the Swift-Tuttle comet, creating a spectacular display of meteors or "shooting stars" in the night sky. Stargazers may be able to spot 60-100 meteors per hour.

Located northeast of Great Bend on K-156 Highway, the KWEC offers an ideal location for comfortable sky-watching. Guests are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets to relax on the KWEC lawn while enjoying the celestial show.

With a Rocket Revolution theme, the evening will feature several rocket and space-themed learning stations. The Kansas Organization for Spacemodeling (KOSMO) will conduct two rocket launches, weather permitting, during the event. They will also have a display table and can answer a wide range of rocket-related questions, and plan to give away four rocket starter kits throughout the night.

Other activities include having participants make their own mission control patches complete with their unique astronaut name, conducting a stomp rocket engineering payload challenge, launching their own film canister rockets, and designing a rocket pulley. Planetarium shows will be offered in the inflatable planetarium, and the campfire area will be fully stocked with S'mores supplies.

The event will proceed rain or shine, but clear skies are necessary for optimal meteor shower viewing.

The Kansas Wetlands Education Center, affiliated with FHSU's Werth College of Science, Technology and Mathematics, is located 10 miles northeast of Great Bend along Kansas Highway 156 at Cheyenne Bottoms, 592 NE K-156 Hwy, Great Bend, KS 67530.

\$1 Million Available in Attraction Development Grants

Topeka - Kansas Tourism has announced that applications for the Attraction Development Grants program will open August 17. The program is designed to provide funding support for the development of new tourism attractions or the enhancement of existing attractions that encourage travel to and throughout Kansas. A total of \$1 million will be granted during this round. The deadline for applications is October 16, 2026.

"Investing in tourism means investing in the future of our communities," Lieutenant Governor and Secretary of Commerce David Toland said. "Through this grant program, communities can transform promising ideas into attractions that draw more visitors, support job growth, and generate new economic activity - all while improving quality of life and establishing Kansas as a top travel destination."

The \$1 million available funding will go to support projects that develop or enhance destination-based tourism assets and experiences. Applications will be evaluated based on their potential to increase visitation, generate economic impact, improve the visitor experience and enhance the quality of life in Kansas communities.

"Every Kansas community has its own story to tell, and memorable attractions are one of the best ways to tell those stories," Kansas Tourism Director Bridgette Jobe said. "These grants help create experiences that inspire travelers to explore Kansas, stay longer and discover all the unique places across the Sunflower State."

Red Cross Tips to Go Back to School Safely

[TOPEKA, AUG. 5, 2026] - The first day of school has arrived for some districts, and it's approaching fast for others. The American Red Cross offers tips to help ensure kids have a safe start to their school year.

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY STEPS

1. Teach young children important personal information. Make sure younger students know their phone number, home address, how to contact their parents at work, another trusted adult they can call, and how to dial 911 in an emergency.
2. Remind kids not to talk to strangers. Teach children never to accept rides, gifts, or invitations from someone they don't know.
3. Walk on the sidewalk whenever possible. If there's no sidewalk available, children should walk facing traffic so they can see approaching vehicles.
4. Walking to school? Look both ways before crossing. Kids should stop at every street corner and look left, right, and left again before crossing. Encourage students to cross only at corners, obey crossing signals, and stay within marked crosswalks. Children should avoid running into traffic or crossing between parked cars where drivers may not see them.
5. Does your student ride a bus? Arrive at the bus stop early. Students should get to the bus stop early and wait a safe distance from the curb. Teach kids to wait until the bus comes to a complete stop and only board when instructed by the driver or attendant. Children should stay where the driver can see them and never walk behind the bus.
6. Riding a bike to school? Always wear a helmet. If your student bikes to school, a properly fitted helmet is one of the best ways to prevent serious injuries. Kids should ride on the right side of the road and follow the same direction as traffic.
7. Buckle up. Every time. Whether driving across town or just to school, everyone in the vehicle should wear a seat belt.
8. Use the right car seat or booster seat. Younger children should stay in a car seat or booster seat until the seat belt fits correctly - usually when they are between ages 8-12 and taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Children under 13 should ride in the back seat.
9. Make sure teen drivers wear seat belts. Teen drivers should always buckle up before starting the car, no matter how short the trip.
10. Eliminate distracted driving. Remind teens to avoid texting, calling, eating or drinking while driving to school.

DRIVERS, SLOW DOWN!

Drivers should slow down as children head back to school. Know that yellow flashing lights indicate a school bus is getting ready to stop - motorists should slow down and be prepared to stop. Red flashing lights and an extended stop sign indicate the bus is stopped and children are getting on or off.

Motorists must stop when they are behind a bus, meeting the bus or approaching an intersection where a bus is stopped. Motorists following or traveling alongside a school bus must also stop until the red lights have stopped flashing, the stop arm is withdrawn, and all children have reached safety. This includes two and four-lane highways. If physical barriers such as grassy medians, guide rails or concrete median barriers separate oncoming traffic from the bus, motorists in the opposing lanes may proceed without stopping. Do not proceed until all the children have reached a place of safety.

Former Resident Promoted

1st Sgt. Carl Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Anderson, New Cambria, was promoted to his present rank at ceremonies held recently in Chicago.

1st Sgt. Anderson's wife, Enid, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P.L. Worcester, Oberlin.

The sergeant, presently stationed at the Marine Corps Recruiting Office, LaSalle, Ill., is a 1948 graduate of Salina High School and was employed two years by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., as a lineman prior to his enlistment in the Marines in October of 1950.

Sgt. Anderson was working with the telephone company in Oberlin until he enlisted.

During his nearly 16 years with the Corps, he served in 10 locations, including Vietnam and Korea, where he was a scout sergeant on an artillery forward observer team and was wounded twice.

He returned from Vietnam in July 1965 after serving as acting first sergeant of an artillery battery at Hue Phu Bai.

The Andersons have three children: Clinton, 11; Calvin, 7; and Cheri, 5.

Carl M. "Andy" Anderson was born January 14, 1930, in Vining, Kans., to Arnold and Vera Anderson of New Cambria. He died March 9, 1985, at the Decatur County Hospital. He was 55.

Following graduation from Salina High School, he joined the United States Marine Corps. He retired from the Marines in 1970. He married Enid Worcester of Oberlin in 1954. They had three children.

After his service to his country, Andy served as maintenance supervisor for the Decatur County Hospital. He was also the director of the Decatur County Emergency Medical Service for 10 years. He was a member of the Oberlin American Legion, the Herndon Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the McCook Elks Lodge.

Survivors included his parents, his wife, his sons -- Clinton of Salina and Calvin of Oberlin; his daughter Cheri Diederich of Oberlin; two sisters -- Gloria Ingermanson of Solomon and Joy Callabresi of New Cambria; and two granddaughters -- Amara and Dawn.

Save the Date for Kansas Farm Bureau's 108th Annual Meeting

Kansas Farm Bureau (KFB) will celebrate its 108th annual meeting Dec. 5-7 in Manhattan. The organization's annual meeting will begin on Saturday evening with KFB's Foundation Fundraiser.

On Sunday, informational workshops, tradeshow vendors and a silent auction will be open to attendees. Jason Brown, former NFL lineman who now owns and operates First Fruit Farm in North Carolina, will provide the keynote address.

During the general session, awards for Friends of Agriculture, county Farm Bureaus, media and the 2026 mental health advocate will be presented. Farm Families of the Year and Leadership KFB will be recognized during the banquet Sunday evening, in addition to honoring Distinguished Service honorees.

On Monday, voting delegates will debate and adopt policy statements for 2027, in addition to elections for KFB president and board members from even-numbered Farm Bureau districts.

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Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

Manhattan - For the week ending August 9, 2026, there were 6.2 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 22% very short, 37% short, 36% adequate, and 5% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 20% very short, 35% short, 41% adequate, and 4% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Corn condition rated 8% very poor, 15% poor, 30% fair, 35% good, and 12% excellent. Corn silking was 90%, near 89% last year and 91% for the five-year average. Dough was 67%, near 66% last year and 64% average. Dented was 25%, ahead of 19% last year and 17% average.

Soybean condition rated 2% very poor, 8% poor, 31% fair, 51% good, and 8% excellent. Soybeans blooming was 80%, near 78% last year and 82% average. Setting pods was 57%, ahead of 51% last year and 52% average.

Sorghum condition rated 6% very poor, 20% poor, 37% fair, 30% good, and 7% excellent. Sorghum headed was 48%, near 52% last year, and behind 55% average. Coloring was 16%, near 14% last year, and ahead of 11% average.

Cotton condition rated 5% very poor, 11% poor, 35% fair, 37% good, and 12% excellent. Cotton setting bolls was 87%, ahead of 69% last year and 75% average. Bolls opening was 5%, near 2% last year and 4% average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 7% very poor, 20% poor, 34% fair, 33% good, and 6% excellent.

July Total Tax Collections at \$718.9 Million; 3.5% Above Estimate

Topeka – The State of Kansas ends July 2026 with total tax collections at \$718.9 million. That is \$24.1 million, or 3.5%, above the estimate. Total tax collections were up 7.3% from July 2025.

Individual income tax collections were \$369.7 million. That is \$9.7 million, or 2.7% above the estimate. Individual income tax collections were up 6.4% from July 2025. Corporate income tax collections were \$18.5 million. That is \$5.2 million, or 21.7% below the estimate, but up 0.1% from July 2025.

Combined retail sales and compensating use tax receipts were \$315.3 million, which is \$15.4 million, or 5.1%, above the estimate, and up 8.1% from July 2025.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Dawn Elliott at 7:00 p.m.

The minutes of the regular meeting of June 8, 2026, were read and approved on a motion made by Mayor Elliott and a second by Erwin. Motion carried 3-0.

Bainter presented the 2025 Audit report to the Commission. Bainter informed the Commissioners that there were no statute or budget violations. Mayor Elliott made a motion to accept the audit report as presented. Erwin seconded the motion. (3-0)

Bainter presented the proposed 2027 Budget to the Commissioners. Bainter stated that the City would not need to exceed the Revenue Neutral Rate which was set at 51.250. Erwin made a motion to publish the budget as presented. Schoendaler seconded the motion. Motion carried 3-0. The Budget hearing will be held Monday, August 10, 2026, at 7:00 p.m. during the regular City meeting.

At 7:21 p.m. Sam Schippers joined the meeting by telephone. Pratt reviewed the Petition for Condemnation order for the building at 1017 Sheridan Ave. with Schippers. Schippers had no objections or comments and left the meeting at 7:22 p.m. Erwin moved to

approve the order, with Schoendaler seconding. Motion carried 3-0. The order was then signed by the Board and the Clerk.

Chief Wisinger presented a sample scooter and e-bike ordinance to the Commission, noting safety concerns for children riding them and the need for an ordinance. The Commission asked Wisinger to check whether nearby towns have similar ordinances. Wisinger will also look into sending out a survey.

Armknecht reported that Kaden Tremblay had completed six months with the City and gave him a positive review. Erwin moved to approve a \$1.00 per hour pay increase for Tremblay, effective August 1, 2026. Schoendaler seconded the motion. Motion carried 3-0.

Armknecht reported that KDHE found no compliance issues during its inspection. He noted that KDHE recommends an annual review of water rates. The state average base water rate is \$19.00, compared to Hoxie’s \$13.00 base rate. To qualify for KDHE grants, cities must meet the state average. No decision was made regarding a water rate increase.

Trash truck quotes from Armor Equipment were presented; \$211,152.07 for a Freightliner and \$239,846.57 for a Peterbilt. No decision was made on purchasing a new trash truck at this time.

At 8:00 p.m. on a motion made by Erwin and a second by Mayor Elliott, the board entered into executive session for a period of 10 minutes to discuss matters related to non-elected personnel. Present were the Commissioners, Janet Bainter, Harry Joe Pratt, Justin Armknecht, and Paul Wisinger. The Commissioners exited at 8:10 p.m. with no motions being made.

The warrants and overtime for the month of June were reviewed, approved, and signed by the Commissioners.

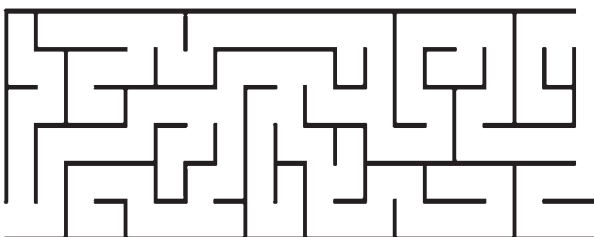
