

Dr. Abraham Padilla Joins Hoxie Veterinary Service Staff



Dr. Abraham Padilla was born in a small town in the state of Jalisco, Mexico, with two older brothers. Growing up, they spent most of their free time helping their dad on a small dairy farm. "My passion for working with animals ignited from a very young age. Watching how passionate my dad was about working and caring for his cows is something that I admired. So, I knew when I grew up, I wanted to be closely involved in animal agriculture."

When he was 15 years old, the family moved to the United States and made Leoti, KS, home. Dr. Padilla attended Wichita County High School where he played baseball and football. During his senior year, Abraham decided to pursue a career in veterinary medicine. He attended Colby Community College for two years in the Pre-Vet program,

then transferred to Kansas State University and spent one year in the Animal Science department, finishing out the prerequisite coursework before being accepted into the College of Veterinary Medicine at K-State. He graduated with DVM degree from K-State in May of 2022.

Dr. Abraham's mom and dad, and two brothers still live in Leoti, along with two nephews and two nieces. Last year in September, he married Anna Leigh, who is also from Leoti. She also attended Kansas State University, where she obtained a degree in Animal Science. "We met in high school and have dated since we were sophomores. My wife and I are very excited about being in Hoxie and look forward to starting our family in this great community. We both love animals, and also hope to one day be able to start a small cow-calf herd of our own," stated Abraham.

Dr. Padilla said, "Even though I enjoy working with all animals, large and small, my passion has always been working with cattle. After chatting with Dr. Tim Cantrell (a mutual friend of Dr. Pridey and I) about my desire to work at a clinic with a large volume of large animal work, he suggested Hoxie Veterinary Service as a good fit for me. I am very excited to be a part of this great team and look forward to growing as a new veterinarian, learning from Dr. Pridey and Dr. Brandi Taul."

KBA Recognizes Area Banker For 50 Years of Service

The Kansas Bankers Association recently recognized Charles (Charlie) R White on 50 years of banking in the State of Kansas. White graduated from Sheridan Community High School in Hoxie, Ks in 1960 and moved on to graduate from Kansas State University in January 1967 with a B.S. in Animal Husbandry.

He began his professional career as an extension agent for Riley County, Kansas. In April 1972, he changed his career path to an Agricultural Loan Officer with what was then, First National Bank in Manhattan.

In 1978, White purchased ownership with several partners for First National Bank of Wamego (now known as Bank of the Flint Hills) and began there as an Ag Loan Officer/Vice President. White continued his banking education and attended and graduated from the Graduate School of Banking in Colorado in 1981 and the Senior Bank Officers School in Boston, Massachusetts in 1983.

In 1985, he became President/Chairman of the Board of First National Bank of Wamego and held that position until 2009 when his son, Lance, took over as President.

He remained Chairman of the Board until 2020.

As of now, White is working as Chairman Emeritus of the Board of Bank of the Flint Hills and Chairman of Wamego BancShares.

In his spare time, he enjoys golfing, hunting and fishing and spending time with family, as well enjoying the ranch where he and his family lives. He is proud of his reputation that most bankers have by helping their communities grow and prosper, particularly community banks and has always thought it was special to see how the community grew from the bank and its loans and activities.




A large group of people attended the Jennings American Legion 100th celebration on Saturday.

Update on Emily / Ethan / Thaddeus / Gabriel

Our community currently has four athletes competing in cross country at the collegiate level. Emily Diercks (2021 Hoxie Graduate) and Ethan Weiner (2022 Golden Plains) are both running for Colby Community College and Thaddeus Friess (2019 Hoxie) and Gabriel Friess (2021 Hoxie) have continued their careers running for Benedictine College.

Colby began their competitive season this past Saturday (September 17), when the boys' and girls' teams both went to Lincoln, Nebraska, to compete in the Woody Greeno/Jay Duerksen Invitational. This meet is jointly hosted by University of Nebraska and Nebraska Wesleyan University and cool temperatures promised for not only a competitive race but the opportunity for fast times. Ethan began his college racing career by negotiating the course in a time of 30:35.6, good for 261st place in his first ever 8-kilometer race. Emily began her sophomore season with a big bang as she crushed her time from last year on the same 5K course by 1:48 seconds. Her time of 18:20 was also new PR and placed her in 22nd place in a field of 308 runners. It also would have placed her as the 6th runner for the Kansas State team and the 3rd runner for KU, who both had teams competing at the same race.

Next action for the Trojans is on September 30 at the CHILI PEPPER FESTIVAL hosted by the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville.

The Benedictine College CC team has hit the race circuit twice. Their first race was September 2 at the Sunset Showdown on the campus of University of St. Mary's in Leavenworth. The two Hoxie alumni ran to 11th and 12th place finishes with Gabriel edging his



brother by 2 seconds in times of 26:15 and 26:17 respectively over the 8K course. They then raced at the Larry Young Invitational at the University of Missouri on September 16. This race saw Gabriel break into the top ten with a 9th place finish in a time of 26:24 and Thaddeus was able to place 12th in a time of 26:41 over the 8K course.

Next action for the Ravens is September 30, when they go to Louisville, KY for the LIVE AT LOU CROSS COUNTRY INVITATIONAL.

Prairie Doc® Perspectives: Ask, Then Act

One summer during my college years, I had a roommate who suffered from suicidal thoughts. She'd attempted suicide before we met, and been hospitalized, but continued to struggle. Back in the late 80s, there was very little public understanding of mental health issues, and the stigma was even stronger than it is today. Our other roommate and I didn't know what to do, or where to turn.

Not surprisingly, we didn't handle it well.

However, we did one thing right: we restricted access to lethal means. We secured the knives and took control of her medications. Back before Prozac, the best treatments were lethal if used to overdose.

It's tempting to view people with mental illness as somehow different from the rest of us. On some level, I think we expect that to mean we can't be affected. We want to believe it won't touch us.

However, suicide crosses all boundaries. Anyone can develop suicidal thoughts, so everyone needs to be able to recognize the danger signs

and know what to do.

Risk factors for suicide include a previous suicide attempt, a family history of suicide, and a personal or family history of mental illness or substance use. Living with chronic pain or having experienced violence or abuse in the family are also significant risks. Other stressful life events, such as incarceration, a job loss, a break-up, or bullying, make a difference as well.

There are often, although not always, warning signs.

Watch for talk about being a burden, about feeling hopeless or worthless, about unbearable pain, and about death. There may be mood swings, anger or anxiety, withdrawal from loved ones or activities, or unusual risk taking. Sometimes the signs are more dramatic. There may be overt talk of suicide and actions that suggest preparation for death: saying goodbye, giving away treasured possessions, drafting a will. A person might research methods of suicide and take steps to implement a plan, such as buying a gun. Don't consider talk of suicide

to be a bid for attention. It is a cry for help.

Of course, recognizing risk isn't enough. We need to know what to do. The first step is to ask the question: Are you thinking about suicide? Asking won't "plant the seed." It's ok, in fact it is crucial, to ask. Try to keep the person safe by reducing access to means of suicide. Listen, and try to understand what they are thinking and feeling. Connect them to help, via the crisis line or another source of support and assistance. Stay in touch.

Emily, if you ever read this, your life matters. I wish we'd understood how to show you that.

Legislation Introduced to Increase Veterans' Travel Reimbursement Rates

Increased rates would help offset rising transportation costs. U.S. Senators Jerry Moran (R-Kan.) and Jon Tester (D-Mont.) - ranking member and chairman of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee (SVAC) - today introduced legislation that will increase reimbursement rates for veterans who must travel to receive medical care provided through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). U.S. Representative Doug LaMalfa (R-Calif.) will introduce companion legislation in the House.

In response to high inflation, the Veterans Medical Mileage Adjustment Act of 2022 would increase the reimbursement rate for the Beneficiary Travel Program for eligible veterans who have to travel more than seven miles for VA-related health care.

This legislation is cosponsored by Senators Kevin Cramer (R-N.D.), Maggie Hassan (D-N.H.), Thom Tillis (R-N.C.), Patty Murray (D-Wash.), Mike Rounds (R-S.D.), Sherrod Brown (D-Ohio) and Kyrsten Sinema (D-Ariz.).

Additionally, this legislation is endorsed by the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. (VFW), Disabled American Veterans (DAV) and Wounded Warrior Project.

The Veterans Medical Mileage Adjustment Act of 2022 would:

1. Increase the VA mileage reimbursement rate from \$0.415 to \$0.455 per mile.
2. Help cover the out-of-pocket expenses veterans and their caregivers incur when scheduled health care of medical disability examinations require them to travel more than seven miles, or more than 14 miles round trip.
3. Incorporate the findings of the annual Internal Revenue Service study on transportation costs showing an increase in fuel, insurance, maintenance, depreciation, and other costs to lessen the burden on veterans and caregivers.
4. Apply the increase to any veteran or caregiver currently eligible for the Beneficiary Travel reimbursement benefit for travel that occurs after enactment of the Veterans Medical Mileage Adjustment Act of 2022.

KU Nursing Ranked a Top-25 Public Program

U.S. News and World Report has again ranked the University of Kansas School of Nursing in its top-25 best undergraduate nursing programs in the nation.

The school remained 22nd among all public colleges and universities, and it rose from 31st to 29th of all schools in the Best Colleges Ranking for 2023.

"We're pleased to have maintained and improved our rank among a field of very strong educational programs," said Sally Maliski, Ph.D., FAAN, dean of KU School of Nursing. "This reflects the hard work of our entire faculty, staff and students. Now more than ever, it's important to focus on our mission of producing nurses to enter the demanding health care field."

A field of 681 schools were judged in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) category. While U.S. News and World Report has provided college rankings yearly since 1983, this is just its second year of ranking undergraduate nursing programs.

KU School of Nursing worked with the University of Kansas Medical Center's Office of Enterprise Analytics to complete surveys sent by U.S. News and World Report. Though the surveys are time-consuming and detailed, Maliski said, they do offer the school a side-by-side comparison of peer institutions.

"The preparation gives us a chance to reflect, and the results of the ranking give us validation that we're headed in the right direction," Maliski said.

Earlier this spring, graduate programs were ranked, and U.S. News and World Report ranked another KU School of Nursing program, the Nursing-Midwifery program, as No. 11 among public universities.

KU School of Nursing has campuses in Salina, Kansas, and Kansas City, Kansas.

Senators Call Out Woke Credit Card CEOs Infringing on Second Amendment Rights

U.S. Senator Roger Marshall, M.D. led 11 of his Senate Republican colleagues on a letter to the CEOs of Visa, Mastercard, and American Express condemning them for removing gun sales from being categorized as "general merchandise" and instead placing gun sales into a separate category. The CEOs decision came at the recommendation of the International Organization for Standardization (ISO), which has no authority over the affairs of American businesses. The Senators expressed deep concern that these credit card companies' new policy would infringe upon the Second Amendment Rights of law-abiding American citizens in their letter, writing in part,

"This decision, which is already being hailed by radical anti-gun activists, is the first step towards backdoor gun control on law-abiding Americans... Creating a new merchant code for gun transactions is a choice being made by each of your companies. You are choosing the side of gun control advocates over the privacy and Second Amendment rights of millions of law-abiding Americans... Your companies are the facilitators of the vast majority of daily financial transactions in America, and that gives you incredible influence over everyday commerce, and thus every American's very way of life. If you are intent on abusing that influence you will leave Congress no choice but to intercede on behalf of our constituents and all of the law abiding Americans who will not stand by as large banks and the payment networks that serve them do an end run around their constitutional Second Amendment rights to keep and bear arms..."

The Senators concluded their letter by requesting answers from the CEOs related to what factors influenced each company to settle on this new policy, how the recategorization of gun sales backs up claims that the action would reduce gun violence, and if customers would be able to continue to use these companies' services without discrimination, among other issues.

Senators Thom Tillis (NC), John Barrasso (WY), Cynthia Lummis (WY), Rick Scott (FL), Ben Sasse (NE), Marco Rubio (FL), Dan Sullivan (AK), Mike Crapo (ID), Bill Cassidy (LA), James Risch (ID), and Steve Daines (MT) cosigned Senator Marshall's letter.

Recently, the International Organization for Standardization, which is based in Switzerland, approved a new merchant category code that is exclusive to gun retailers. Although Visa, Mastercard, and American Express are under no legal obligation to conform to ISO policies, all three companies adopted the new merchant category code for gun purchases with their credit cards. Previously, gun purchases with these credit cards would have fallen into the "general merchandise" merchant category code.

USDA to Triple Commitment: \$2.8B Initial Investment

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced today that the Biden-Harris Administration through the U.S. Department of Agriculture is investing up to \$2.8 billion in 70 selected projects under the first pool of the Partnerships for Climate-Smart Commodities funding opportunity, with projects from the second funding pool to be announced later this year. Ultimately, USDA's anticipated investment will triple to more than \$3 billion in pilots that will create market opportunities for American commodities produced using climate-smart production practices. These initial projects will expand markets for climate-smart commodities, leverage the greenhouse gas benefits of climate-smart commodity production and provide direct, meaningful benefits to production agriculture, including for small and underserved producers. Applicants submitted more than 450 project proposals in this first funding pool, and the strength of the projects identified led USDA to increase its investment in this opportunity from the initial \$1 billion Vilsack announced earlier this year.

September WASDE Drops Corn, Soybean Production

The monthly World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates, released Monday by USDA's Office of the Chief Economist, decreased corn supply for the start of the new marketing year, largely driven by a drop in production from a reduction in national average yield and area harvested. Corn production is forecast 415 million bushels lower than last month at 13.9 billion bushels. The national yield for corn is forecast at 172.5 bushels per acre, down 2.9 bushels or 2 percent from last month. USDA increased soybean beginning stocks and decreased production. Soybean production was forecast down 152 million bushels at 4.4 billion due to smaller harvested area and yield. Harvested area is down 0.6 million acres from August.

Soybean yield is forecast at 50.5 bushels per acre, down 1.4 bushels or 3 percent from last month. USDA increased 2022/23 cotton production and ending stocks compared to August. Production was forecast at 13.8 million bales, 1.3 million bales higher than August due to higher production expectations in most major cotton-producing states despite the slight decrease in average yield. The 2022/23 wheat outlook for September is unchanged. Read the Market Intel for details.

Kansas Milk Production

Milk production in Kansas during August 2022 totaled 347 million pounds, up 3% from August 2021, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The average number of milk cows was 174,000 head, 4,000 head more than August 2021. Milk production per cow averaged 1,995 pounds.

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending September 18, 2022, there were 6.5 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 48% very short, 36% short, 16% adequate, and 0% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 51% very short, 37% short, 12% adequate, and 0% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat planted was 15%, near 12% last year, and ahead of 10% for the five-year average.

Corn condition rated 27% very poor, 27% poor, 25% fair, 19% good, and 2% excellent. Corn denting was 90%, near 92% last year and 93% average. Mature was 61%, near 60% last year, and equal to average. Harvested was 27%, ahead of 19% last year and 17% average.

Soybean condition rated 22% very poor, 26% poor, 30% fair, 21% good, and 1% excellent.

Soybeans setting pods was 95%, equal to last year, and near 96% average. Dropping leaves was 40%, ahead of 34% both last year and average. Harvested was 2%, near 1% average.

Sorghum condition rated 22% very poor, 31% poor, 31% fair, 15% good, and 1% excellent.

Sorghum headed was 95%, behind 100% last year, and near 99% average. Coloring was 73%, behind 88% last year and 85% average. Mature was 20%, behind 35% last year and 25% average. Harvested was 2%, near 4% last year and 3% average.

Cotton condition rated 7% very poor, 37% poor, 39% fair, 17% good, and 0% excellent. Cotton bolls opening was 55%, ahead of 45% last year, and well ahead of 35% average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 44% very poor, 30% poor, 18% fair, 8% good, and 0% excellent.

Dr. Steve Mosier, DVM

December 14, 1942 ~ September 11, 2022



Dr. Steven Ray "Steve" Mosier, DVM, 79, Hays, entered Heaven on September 11, 2022, surrounded at the time of his passing by family and skilled, caring HaysMed staff. This date fell on National Pet Memorial Day.

Steve was born on December 14, 1942, in Hoxie, the 10th child of Decker and Lela (Mowry) Mosier, arriving five minutes before his twin brother, Stanley Jay. Henceforth and ever known as "the twins" by Lela, Decker, and his siblings, they were promptly placed in a shoe box to be kept warm in the farmstead oven. Their antics would become the stuff of legend throughout their childhood and adult years, from a fire lit playing with matches under the bed to pretending to be the other brother.

Steve went to Saint Paul School in rural Hoxie for six years and then into town for 7th and 8th grade. He graduated from Sheridan Community High School in 1960. He placed third in state wrestling his junior year and second his senior year, holding the flame of Hoxie's notable wrestling history at a time when Hoxie competed with all of Kansas. This talent would serve him later in life, as his daughters Karen, Kristen, Karla, and Kayleen unanimously recall being pinned simultaneously, each under an arm or leg and with no hope of escape, during spontaneous family floor wrestling. His grandchildren, Ethan, Decker, Isaac, Ben, and Hannah were also met with his famous full and half nelsons.

Steve went on to Kansas State University and, like four brothers before him, attended the School of Veterinary Medicine, graduating in 1966. On June 5, 1965, he married Linda Louise Ward in Manhattan. Following graduation, Steve and Linda moved to Wichita to begin veterinary practice and then onto Aurora, NE. From 1967-1969, Steve served in the US Army Veterinary Corps and was stationed in St. James, MN. He was responsible for inspection of food going to overseas military and was a Survivor's Assistance Officer, personally notifying 16 families regarding their fallen loved ones. He also assisted these families in planning funeral services. Following his military service there, Steve and Linda returned to Wichita in 1969, and then went on to join Hays Veterinary Hospital, hired by Dr. Paul McRae, DVM in 1970, choosing Hays because it was in-between Linda's parents in Manhattan and Steve's in Hoxie. Steve became full practice owner in 1995. His practice was purchased by Dr. Mark Meier in 2020. Steve thought that Dr. Meier, raised in Hays, was the perfect owner for the clinic.

Steve spent 50 of his 57 years in the practice of veterinary medicine in Hays. He felt very privileged to be a part of the human-animal bond. During his time as a practicing veterinarian, he was president of the Kansas Veterinary Medical Association in 1992 and received recognition as Kansas Veterinarian of the Year in 2000. In 2005, the Mosier family received the Alumni Recognition Award from the Kansas State University College of Veterinary Medicine. His favorite recognition was the Kansas Veterinary Medical Association Lifetime Achievement Award (2016) because it was presented to him by friend and colleague, Dr. John Nelson.

Steve's daughters were all a part of his practice in some way while growing up, and his grandchildren continued this tradition. Whether riding along on a country call where Steve managed to grab a daughter and a diaper while enroute to pull a calf or waiting patiently at the grocery store or in the car while Steve visited with a client about their livestock or beloved pet, Steve made room for his family in his practice, and many memories surround experiences there. In the surgery suite, his daughters could be found observing the precision of a surgeon, and his ability to suture as though conducting a symphony. There were after hours cesarean sections, calf deliveries, x-rays, and broken bones. The girls were happy to assist on night calls, as were his grandchildren. For twenty-five years, Kayleen served alongside Steve as his practice manager. He accomplished his service through the love and support of his wife, Linda, as well.

Steve enjoyed traveling with his family, with favorite destinations being to beaches and to the mountains of Estes Park. He also held very fond memories of a family trip to Scotland in 1999.

Survivors include his wife, Linda, of Hays, four daughters: Karen Nicholson and husband, Blake; Kristen Hill and husband, Christian; Karla DuBois and husband, Justin, all of Estes Park, CO; and Kayleen Geist and husband, Garrett, of Hays; three brothers: Frank Mosier and wife Joan, of Manhattan; Dr. Richard Mosier and wife, Mary, of Claremore, OK; and Dr. Larry Mosier of Sargent, NE, a sister, Louise Simcox, of Salina; three sisters-in-law: Betty Mosier of Manhattan, Bunny Mosier of Cedar Rapids, NE, and Kathy Mosier of Wichita; five grandchildren: Blake "Decker", Ben, and Hannah Nicholson, Ethan and Isaac Hill, and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents, an infant son: Darren Ward Mosier, five brothers: Ben, Dr. Jacob, Dr. Ross, Dr. Don, and Dr. Stan Mosier, a sister: Lila Marie Fansher and husband, Stan, a brother-in-law: Flavel Simcox; two sisters-in-law: Joann and Margaret Mosier; and a nephew, Craig Mosier.

Family Inurnment with military honors conducted by the Fort Riley Funeral Detail was held Sunday, September 18, 2022, in the Hoxie Cemetery followed by a gathering at the family farm, Sheephead Ranch. ORDINANCE NO. 731

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING NEX-TECH, LLC A LIMITED LIABILITY COMPANY, ITS PARENT COMPANY (RURAL TELEPHONE SERVICE COMPANY, INC., A KANSAS CORPORATION), SUCCESSORS, TRANSFEREES AND ASSIGNS, A NON-EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE TO ERECT, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE A TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF CITY OF HOXIE, KANSAS, PRESCRIBING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS THEREOF AND PROVIDING FOR PAYMENTS TO BE MADE TO THE CITY OF HOXIE, KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HOXIE, SHERICAN COUNTY, KANSAS:

ARTICLE 1
DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of granting this Franchise, the following terms shall have the meaning as described herein:

- 1.1. **City.** "City" shall mean the City of Hoxie, Kansas, and shall include, when appropriate, the context of the territorial boundaries of the city limits of Hoxie, Kansas, as they now or shall hereafter exist.
- 1.2. **City Council.** "City Council" shall mean the present governing body of the City or any successor to the legislative powers of the present City Council.
- 1.3. **Franchise.** "Franchise" shall mean the permission, license or authority given hereunder to conduct and operate a telecommunications system in the City, pursuant to this Ordinance passed by the City Council.
- 1.4. **Grantee.** "Grantee" shall mean Nex-Tech, its parent company (Rural Telephone Service Company, Inc.), subsidiaries, successors, transferees or assigns of the Franchise granted herein.
- 1.5. **Franchise Revenue.** "Franchise Revenue" shall mean a flat monthly fee or a percentage of annual Franchise Revenue received by Grantee for basic service rates collected from subscribers of Grantee's local telephone service; provided, however, that such phrase shall not include: (i) revenues received from any advertising carried on the telecommunications system; (ii) revenues from optional calling features; (iii) any taxes imposed directly or indirectly on any subscriber by any governmental unit or agency, and collected by Grantee on behalf of such governmental unit or agency; (iv) any revenues derived from installation charges; or (v) revenues derived from Internet access.
- 1.6. **Street.** "Street" shall mean the surface of, and the space above and below, any public street, road, highway, freeway, lane, path, alley, court, sidewalk, parkway, drive or other easement now or hereafter held by the City for the purpose of public travel. It shall also include such other easements or right-of-ways as shall be now or hereafter held by the City, and which shall within their proper use and meaning entitle the City and Grantee to install or transmit telecommunications transmissions over poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, appliances, attachments, and other property as may be ordinarily necessary and pertinent to a Telecommunications System.
- 1.7. **Property of Grantee.** "Property of Grantee" shall mean all property owned and installed or used by Grantee in the conduct of its telecommunications business in the City and under the authority of the Franchise granted herein.
- 1.8. **Telecommunications System.** "Telecommunications System" shall mean all equipment used to transport voice communications.
- 1.9. **Subscriber.** "Subscriber" shall mean any person or entity receiving, for any purpose, one or more of the services offered within Grantee's Telecommunications System.
- 1.10. **Person.** "Person" shall mean any individual or association of individuals, or any firm, corporation or other business entity.
- 1.11. **Telecommunications Facilities.** "Telecommunications Facilities" shall mean property of the Grantee used in operation of the Telecommunications System.

ARTICLE 2
GRANT OF FRANCHISE

- 2.1. **General Grant.** The City hereby grants to Grantee the right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain a Telecommunications System within the City and, in so doing, to use the Streets of the City by erecting, installing, constructing, repairing, replacing, reconstructing, maintaining and retaining in, on, under, upon or across any such Street, such poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, appliances, attachments and other property as may be necessary and pertinent to a Telecommunications System within the City.
- 2.2. **Non-Exclusivity.** The authority given to Grantee in Section 2.1 is not and shall not be deemed to be an exclusive right or permission. The City expressly reserves the right to grant similar non-exclusive franchises to other Persons and allow them to use the Streets of the City within the same or other areas of the City as Grantee at any time; provided, however, that such other franchises do not interfere or create interference with Grantee's Telecommunications System already established and said other franchisees shall not be extended preferential treatment over Grantee.
- 2.3. **Notice Concerning Complaints.** Notice of the procedures for reporting and resolving complaints shall be given to each Subscriber at the time of the initial subscription to the Telecommunications System.
- 2.4. **Modifications.** Any modification of the provisions of the federal franchise standards resulting from an amendment of the standards by the Federal Communications Commission must be incorporated into this Franchise within one (1) year of the adoption of the modification, or at the time of renewal, whichever occurs first. It shall also be the policy of the City to amend this Franchise, upon application of Grantee, when necessary, to enable Grantee to take advantage of any developments in the telecommunications field which would afford Grantee an opportunity to more effectively, efficiently or economically serve its Subscribers, and to enable Grantee to conform to the Rules and Regulations of the Kansas Corporation Commission and the Federal Communications Commission as they may be amended from time to time.

ARTICLE 3
TERM

The initial term of this Ordinance shall be for a period of one (1) year and shall automatically renew for successive one (1) year terms unless written notice of intent to terminate is given by either the City or Grantee, to the other, at least 30 days prior to expiration of the then current term.

ARTICLE 4
FORFEITURE

In addition to all other rights and powers reserved or pertaining to the City, the City reserves as an additional, separate and distinct remedy the right to revoke this Franchise and all rights and privileges of the Grantee hereunder for any of the following reasons:

- a. Grantee fails, after thirty (30) days prior written notice, to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance granting this Franchise or has, by act or omission, violated any term or condition thereof;
- b. Any provision of this Ordinance is adjudged by a court of law as invalid or unenforceable, and the City Council finds that such provision constitutes a consideration material to the continuance of the Franchise granted herein;
- c. Grantee becomes insolvent, unable or unwilling to pay its debts or is adjudged bankrupt;
- d. Grantee attempts to or does practice any fraud or deceit in its conduct or relations with the City or its Subscribers under this Franchise; or
- e. The City condemns all Property of Grantee within the City by lawful exercise of eminent domain.

ARTICLE 5
ORDINANCE OF REVOCATION

No revocation provided for in Article 4, except for reasons of condemnation as described in Article 4(e), shall be effective unless or until the City Council provides written notice to Grantee, and Grantee is given at least thirty (30) days to cure any alleged breach of Article 4 herein. If, upon expiration of the time to cure, City Council believes Grantee has failed to cure, the City Council must adopt an Ordinance setting forth the cause and reason for the revocation and the effective date thereof in order to effectuate any revocation. Such Ordinance shall not be adopted without thirty (30) days prior written notice thereof to Grantee along with an opportunity for Grantee to be heard on the proposed adoption of said proposed Ordinance. If the revocation as proposed in said Ordinance depends upon a finding of fact, such finding of fact must be made by the City Council after a conclusive hearing is provided, if requested by Grantee.

ARTICLE 6
COMPENSATION

In consideration of granting this Franchise to Grantee, Grantee shall pay the City an amount equal to One Dollar and Four Cents (\$1.04) per access line per month from the operation of the business in said City. This fee will be collected as a "pass-through" from the Subscribers. Such payment shall be made by Grantee to the City in arrears on a quarterly basis, within sixty (60) days of the end of each remittal period, for the duration of this Ordinance. The City agrees to accept this sum as full and fair compensation.

ARTICLE 7
INDEMNIFICATION

Grantee shall, concurrently with the filing of the acceptance of this Franchise, furnish to the City and file with the City Clerk proof of a liability insurance policy in the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) with a company approved by the City and in a form satisfactory to the City Attorney. Such policy shall indemnify and defend the City, its officers, councils, boards, commissions, agents and employees from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, suits and proceedings by others, against all liabilities to others and against any loss, costs, expenses or damages resulting there from or arising out of the exercise or enjoyment of this Franchise.

ARTICLE 8
USE AND INSTALLATION

- 8.1. **Degree of Care.** Grantee or any Persons erecting, constructing or maintaining any of the Property of Grantee shall, at all times, employ due care or the highest degree of care required by law under the facts and circumstances and shall maintain and install the Property of Grantee in accordance with commonly accepted methods and principals so as to prevent failures and accidents likely to damage, injure or create a public nuisance.
- 8.2. **Location of Facility.** All Telecommunications Facilities shall be located so as to cause minimum interference with the proper use of Streets and the rights and reasonable

convenience of property owners abutting the Streets. In no event shall such Telecommunications Facilities be located so as to substantially interfere with the usual public travel on any Street within the City.

8.3. **Damage to Public Property.** Whenever Grantee or any person on its behalf causes any injuries or damage to any public property or Street by or because of the installation, maintenance or operation of the Telecommunications Facilities, such injury or damage shall be immediately remedied in such fashion as directed by the City Superintendent at Grantee's expense.

8.4. **Tree Trimming.** Grantee shall have authority to trim trees upon and over the Streets of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with wires, cables and other Telecommunications Facilities. All trimming shall be done under the supervision of the City Superintendent at Grantee's expense.

8.5. **Facilities Upgrades/Changes.** Grantee shall exercise its right to place, remove, construct and reconstruct, extend and maintain its plant and appurtenances as the business, and purposes for which, may from time to time require along, across, on, over, through, above and under any public right-of-ways including, but not limited to, Streets, avenues, alleys, bridges and the public grounds and places within the limits of the City at Grantee's expense.

ARTICLE 9
REMOVAL AND ABANDONMENT OF PROPERTY

If this Franchise is terminated or revoked, Grantee shall remove from the Streets all of its Telecommunications Facilities other than those which the City may permit to be abandoned in place. In the event of such removal, Grantee shall return the Street to similar condition as it was in before the Telecommunications Facilities were placed.

ARTICLE 10
OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

Grantee shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable Grantee to exercise its rights and perform its services under this Franchise and to assure an uninterrupted service to all of its customers. Grantee shall render efficient service, make repairs promptly and only interrupt service for good cause for the shortest time possible. In order to limit failure and malfunctions of the Telecommunications System and to enable prompt correction at all times after notice of malfunction or failure, Grantee shall consistently maintain a listed telephone, which shall be operated to receive complaints, requests for repairs or adjustments because of malfunctions at any time of day Sunday through Saturday, including holidays.

Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the City, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings. The expense of such temporary action shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and Grantee shall have the authority to require advance payment. Grantee shall be given no less than forty-eight (48) hours advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes.

ARTICLE 11
COMPLIANCE WITH THE LAW

Grantee shall, at all times during the term of this Franchise, be subject to all lawful exercises of the police power of the City and to such reasonable regulations as the City shall prescribe for the general conduct of persons providing telecommunications service within the City.

ARTICLE 12
GRANTEE WITHOUT RECOURSE

Grantee shall have no recourse whatsoever against the City for any loss, cost, expense or damage arising out of any of the provisions or requirements of this Franchise or because of the enforcement thereof by the City, nor for the failure of the City to have the authority to grant all or any part of the Franchise.

ARTICLE 13
GRANTEE'S RATES AND REGULATIONS

Grantee shall have the right and power to fix, charge, collect and receive reasonable rates for the services it provides through its Telecommunications System; provided, that such rates shall not be established on a discriminatory basis.

ARTICLE 14
NOTICES

Whenever, under the terms of this Franchise, either party shall be required or permitted to give notice to the other, such notice shall be made in writing, and delivered by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, as follows:

ARTICLE 15
MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

15.1 **Supersedes Prior Ordinances.** All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed as of the Effective Date of this Ordinance. This Ordinance specifically supersedes the previously adopted Ordinances.

15.2 **Binding Effect.** All provisions of this Ordinance shall be binding upon Grantee and all its subsidiaries, successors, transferees and assigns, whether expressly stated herein or not.

15.3 **Assignment.** City shall not sell, assign or transfer this Agreement or any part thereof without the prior written consent of Grantee; however, Grantee may, without the consent of City assign any or all of its rights and obligations under this Agreement to its parent, any subsidiary (of Grantee or its parent), or any affiliate (of Grantee or its parent) or to any successor in interest pursuant to a sale of stock or assets, merger, acquisition, or reorganization.

15.4 **Negotiations.** In the event the parties are actively negotiating in good faith a new contract franchise ordinance or an amendment to this Contract franchise upon the termination date of this Contract Franchise, the parties by written mutual agreement may extend the termination date of this Contract franchise to allow for further negotiations. Such extension period shall be deemed a continuation of this Contract franchise and not as a new contract franchise ordinance or amendment.

Commission Minutes
9/13/22

Now on this 13th day of September 2022, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Wes Bainter presiding. Others present were Joe Bainter, Mike "Buck" Mader, County Attorney Joe Pratt and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were Carolyn Meyer and The Sheridan Sentinel.

At 8:00 a.m. Wes Bainter called the meeting to order.

Those in attendance stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Karl Pratt, Executive Director Sheridan County Community Foundation & Economic Development Corporation came to the table. Pratt stated there is a grant opportunity he would like the County to put forth. It is for an amount up to \$50,000 for projects related to community vibrancy, childcare/senior programming, libraries, and food retail. This grant opportunity was set up by statute in 2021. Receipts will have to be monitored to ensure that the funds are being used appropriately. Everything will run through the County. The County will be responsible for a 10% match which Pratt said he would like the County to apply to the Sheridan County Community Foundation to cover.

Pratt is working on a grant application for the City of Hoxie and would like a letter of support from the Board. The application is due Friday, September 16. Pratt will get the information to Bracht so the letter can be created. Pratt advised the board they have broken ground for the daycare duplex project in Sunrise Addition. The first bill has been received from Bainter Construction in the amount of \$58,500. Can the county pay this bill at this time? The board agreed that the county had committed the \$100,000 so the entire amount will be submitted to the Community Foundation to manage.

Joe Pratt stated he will contact Penco Engineering and have them proceed with the paperwork for Bridge #58.

Shirley Niermeier came to the table and distributed to the board and Pratt the delinquent tax roll. Pratt will start the process for a Sheriff's Sale.

Joe Herskowitz, Road & Bridge Supervisor, came to the table. Herskowitz stated Whitney Construction from Norton, KS, had contacted him with questions on Bridge #56 (Popp bridge). Herskowitz brought up road 80E to the north and the cattle guards. By consensus, the cattle guards will be moved, and fencing

will be put in place by the Road Department.

There was discussion about Herskowitz being able to pay a new employee more than the written starting wage if the employee is coming with experience. The Board stated Herskowitz will have to be fair about it and the pay would be at his discretion, but he does need to bring it to the Board for discussion when the situation arises.

McCormick Excavation & Paving will get Herskowitz a quote for the Y east of Selden.

Penco Engineering is going to submit the application to the State for Sheridan Avenue. The cost will be shared between the City of Hoxie and Sheridan County. Herskowitz will contact Jerol DeBoer from Penco and make sure they are moving forward as the deadline is this month.

Mader made a motion to approve the September 9, 2022 Payroll as presented. Joe Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0

The September 13, 2022 Warrants were approved on a motion by Joe Bainter and second by Wes Bainter. Carried 3-0

Joe Bainter made a motion, seconded by Mader, to approve the September 6, 2022 Minutes as presented. Carried 3-0

The Board briefly discussed dispatch, the loss of dispatchers and the difficulty that there seems to be to have another county dispatch for Sheridan County. The discussion will continue.




