New Provider Joins SCHC

The middle of August, Sheridan County Health Care will be adding another Physician Assistant with Chris Hansen.

Chris spent his childhood in Tacoma, WA before joining the Marines just out of high school. After spending five years in the Marines, he joined the Army Special Forces. Toward the end of his eleven years of Special Forces, he got the opportunity to train and a Special Forces Medic. After training he found himself doing surgery in sub-Saharan Africa with no "adult supervision" and no one to call for advice.

After the realization that he might actually survive his military career - and having no legal use for his weapons expertise - Chris decided the medic training was a food start to a post-military career. He attended Wichita State for PA School and worked several rotations in western Kansas. After graduating, he took a job with Greeley County Health Systems at the clinic in Sharon Springs, where he worked for five years.

Moving to Alaska with a 2 and 3-year old made for an

interesting change of pace for the Hansen's. It was a different type of medicine entirely, living in a small native village of 120 or so people. There were no roads in or out, only accessible by plane or snow machine in the winter. One village they lived in was White Mountain, which is on the Iditarod trail.

It was in White Mountain that Chris was introduced to the administrative side of health care. There was no facility administrator, so he was assigned the task of straightening out paperwork with the HRSA grants or the facility would close. The facility was struggling to find an administrator and wanted the Hansen's to move to Nome where Chris could be the full-time administrator. He was not interested in this, so they moved to Skagway. Skagway is a primarily tourist culture with about 300-year-round residents. The tourists presented "a whole spectrum of opportunities for providing health care."

The Hansen's son just went to boot camp and their daughter is going to be attending her

It is now our mission at the Sheridan County Sheriff's Department, to do everything we can to rid our county of illegal narcotics, and the narcotics K-9 program gives us an upper hand in finding these illegal narcotics.

Annual Hansen Scholarship Program Announced

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation will make scholarships available in five categories to students in 26 Northwest Kansas counties for the 2019-2020 academic year. Students from an accredited high school, registered independent, private or home school in one of the following 26 counties are eligible to apply:

Cheyenne, Cloud, Decatur, Ellis, Ellsworth, Gove, Graham, Jewell, Lincoln, Logan, Mitchell, Norton, Osborne, Ottawa, Phillips, Rawlins, Republic, Rooks, Russell, Saline, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Thomas, Trego and Wallace.

Scholarships available for students who will graduate in the current academic year are:

Ten Leaders of Tomorrow Scholarships with annual stipends of \$10,000 renewable for three additional years if criteria established by the Scholarship Committee are met. Recipients must attend an accredited four-year public, private or church related Kansas college or university.

Fifty Hansen Scholarships with stipends of \$6,500 renewable for three additional years if criteria established by the Scholarship Committee are met. Recipients must attend an accredited four-year public, private or church related Kansas college or university.

One hundred Hansen Student Scholarships with stipends of \$4,000 renewable for one additional year, providing the recipients have achieved at least a 3.00 GPA at the college level. Recipients must attend an accredited community, public, private or church related college or university in Kansas.

To qualify for the above scholarships, a student must have taken the ACT test and have a composite score of 21 or

higher and have at least a 3.50 GPA (un-weighted). The student should be an active participant in extracurricular school and community activities, display good citizenship, leadership, and moral integrity.

Students planning to enter the competition for Leaders of Tomorrow, Hansen Scholar or Hansen Student scholarships must register at their school and take the qualifying test at locations to be announced. Information on all scholarships has been sent to qualifying area schools. Tentative test dates have been set for September 11 and 12, 2019.

One hundred Hansen Career and Technical Education Scholarships with stipends of \$4,000 renewable for one additional year, providing the recipients have achieved at least a 3.00 GPA at the college level. Career and Technical Education Scholarships are available to encourage high school seniors who seek competence through career training. An applicant for the Career and Technical Education Scholarship must complete an application form that is available from the high school counselor or it can be downloaded from our website at www.danehansenfoundation.org. The Scholarship Committee is interested in the student's character, activities and goals. Applicants for the Hansen Career and Technical Education Scholarship are not required to take a qualifying test. A 3.50 GPA is not necessary to apply for this scholarship. Recipients may enroll in any career and technical education program, in any Kansas school, as long as it is not leading to a four-year degree.

In addition to the scholarships offered to high school seniors, the Hansen Foundation will also award twenty Community or Technical College Transfer Scholarships with stipends of

\$4,000 each. These scholarships are available for Kansas Community or Technical College students. Community College students must have completed a minimum of 32 hours of college credit by the Spring of 2020 and Technical College students must have completed an associate of applied science degree before transferring to an accredited four-year public, private or church related Kansas college or university. Each Community or Technical College Transfer Scholarship may be renewed for one year upon completion of satisfactory work as evaluated by the Scholarship Committee. Students may obtain application forms at the office of the Dean of Student Services at the Community College or Technical College Student Services or it can be downloaded from our website at www.danehansenfoundation.org.

Through scholarships the Trustees of the Dane G. Hansen Foundation encourage good citizenship and high achievement in academic endeavors. Improvement of educational opportunities for students in Western Kansas ranks high among the objectives of the Trustees of the Hansen Foundation.

The Hansen Foundation is in its 45th year of service to the young people of Northwest Kansas through the insight and generosity of the late Dane G. Hansen of Logan, Kansas. The book DANE GRAY HANSEN: TITAN OF NORTHWEST KANSAS by Billy M. Jones (1962) describes Dane G. Hansen and his contributions to Northwest Kansas.

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending July 28, 2019, there were 6.7 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 8 percent very short, 32 short, 58 adequate, and 2 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 3 percent very short, 20 short, 74 adequate, and 3 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Corn condition rated 3 percent very poor, 9 poor, 31 fair, 46 good, and 11 excellent. Corn silking was 71 percent, well behind 91 last year, and behind 86 for the five-year

average. Dough was 24 percent, well behind 47 last year, and behind 31 average. Dented was 2 percent, behind 9 last year, and equal to average.

Soybean condition rated 3 percent very poor, 8 poor, 39 fair, 44 good, and 6 excellent. Soybeans blooming was 40 percent, well behind 82 last year and 66 average. Setting pods was 12 percent, well behind 45 last year, and behind 28 average.

Sorghum condition rated 1 percent very poor, 5 poor, 25 fair, 62 good, and 7 excellent. Sorghum headed was 10 percent,

well behind 36 last year, and behind 26 average. Coloring was 1 percent, near 3 last year, and equal to average.

Cotton condition rated 8 percent very poor, 19 poor, 40 fair, 30 good, and 3 excellent. Cotton squaring was 67 percent, well behind 91 last year, but near 64 average. Setting bolls was 15 percent, near 19 last year and 14 average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 1 percent very poor, 4 poor, 26 fair, 57 good, and 12 excellent.
