Also, Inga Kurz and Megan Carder did a great job representing the chapter in the Creed Speaking Contest! (FFA photo)



Democrats Form Heartland Senate Fund



On Monday, October 17, the campaigns for Democratic nominees for U.S. Senate Mark Holland (Kansas), Tom McDermott (Indiana), and Brian Bengs (South Dakota) have joined together to create the Heartland Senate Fund, a fundraising venture with the intention of working to make the heartland competitive for Democratic candidates for the U.S. Senate.

There is a belief that the Democratic party has forgotten about voters in the heartland. As recently as 2018, Indiana had a Democratic Senator. In 2004, South Dakota had Democrats in every seat in the Congressional delegation, including the Senate Democratic Leader. In Kansas, Democrats have won 3 of the last 5 Gubernatorial elections. During the recent August primary, Kansas saw a historic turnout rivaling presidential levels with voters overwhelmingly defending a woman's right to choose, 59.16% to 40.84%. While some in the national Democratic

party think we should forget about these states, the people in the heartland are begging for support, because if we run quality campaigns here and have the financial resources needed, we can win. Our message to Washington: America's heartland is ready to

"I am honored for my campaign to join this effort to put the heartland in play," said Reverend Mark Holland. "I entered this race to give Kansans a choice in this election. Kansas voters made their voice heard loud and clear in August: Their interests are not being represented in Washington."

Holland is a United Methodist pastor and is a former mayor of Kansas City, Kansas. Prior to his election as mayor, he served six years as a Commissioner of the Unified Government of Kansas City and Wyandotte County. He is a fourth generation Kansan, the son of a pastor and a public school teacher and the father of four young adults.

The Heartland Senate Fund is a fundraising venture where 100 percent of the proceeds raised will be split evenly between the three U.S. Senate campaigns.



Annual Match Month Fundraising Campaign Begins November 1

For the seventh year in a row, the Sheridan County Community Foundation will once again take part in the Dane G. Hansen Foundation's Match Month initiative accepting donations every day during the month of November 2022.

The Hansen Foundation will provide a 100% match for every dollar raised up to a maximum of \$50,000 per county which will be put into the endowed unrestricted community grant fund. If the full \$50,000 is reached for the grant fund, SCCF will also receive an additional \$45,000 for their operating endowment fund providing for the organization's ongoing sustainability, and an additional \$5,000 for immediate operating needs.

The funds raised during the November 2022 Match Month campaign will be added to SCCF's "Cultivate Sheridan County" endowment fund which will be opened in the future for organizations to apply for grant funding.

What is an endowed fund?

An endowment fund, quite simply, is money set aside (invested) to earn revenue to fund some type of charitable activity. Unlike a typical investment fund, the beneficiary of an endowment fund is a nonprofit organization instead of individual investors.

The principal value of the endowment fund is kept intact, while the investment earnings can be distributable dollars used for charitable grants to nonprofits. Thus, an endowment fund can be held permanently, allowing donors to support causes they care about in perpetuity.

Donations to endowment funds are tax deductible. Donors often set up endowment funds so they can receive charitable tax benefits immediately upon making their donation, while maintaining the social-good grantmaking power for the long-term.

No donation amount is too big or too small for this challenge. All with an affinity for Sheridan County and the communities therein are encouraged to contribute and help make a difference in the lives of those in the area for years to come. Expansion of Child Care Access ~ Input Sought

Expansion of Child Care Access ~ Input Sought

Governor Laura Kelly and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) announced proposed changes to child care regulations that would expand care options across the state. The suggested changes would allow licensed home providers to increase the number of children they care for if certain safety conditions are met, aligning Kansas with the national average child-to-provider ratio.

Summary of Regulation

Affirms children 11 years and older related to the provider do not count in total capacity.

The proposed change updates age on capacity tables from 18 months to 12 months.

Revises the total license capacity based on ages of children in care and license type; Licensed Day Care Homes with one provider and Licensed Group Day Care Homes with two providers.

Updates the age category for the maximum number of children at least 5 years but under 11 years of age; this will be changed to allow the oldest unrelated child in care to be 16 years of age

Proposed table revisions (Note: Table III remained the same).

The girls will continue their season in Rexford on September 29, when they host Western Plains/Healy and Weskan.

















































Bison Auction at Maxwell Wildlife Refuge

The Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks will conduct a public auction to sell surplus bison from Maxwell Wildlife Refuge and the Sandsage Bison Range on Wednesday, November 2, 2022. The auction will begin at 11 a.m. and take place at Maxwell Wildlife Refuge - 6 miles north of Canton in McPherson County. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend. Those interested in bidding should arrive early to receive a bidder number.

Maxwell Wildlife Refuge is managed specifically to preserve the area's prairie heritage. As such, herds of bison and elk are maintained, both species that are native to Kansas grasslands. However, because the Refuge can support only a certain number of animals, surplus bison are occasionally sold at a public auction.

On Nov. 2, 2022, a combined total of 80 bison will be auctioned,

including:

- 15 Cows
- 2 2-yr-old Heifers
- 7 Yearling Heifers
- 13 Heifer Calves 12 - 2-yr-old Bulls
- 15 Yearling Bulls
- 16 Bull Calves

Bison older than a year will be brucellosis and tuberculosis tested and accompanied by a health certificate. Heifer calves older than 6 months will be vaccinated for brucellosis and certificates issued.

Buyers must pick up bison on the day of the sale or make arrangements with the refuge manager prior to the sale. Animals become the buyer's responsibility upon settlement on sale day. Load-out assistance is available until dusk on the day of the

sale. Stock racks and trailers should be covered or lined, as bison transport best in dark conditions. Cash and personal checks (if accompanied by a notarized

authorization letter from the issuing bank) will be accepted. KDWP reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

Kansas Crop Production Report

Based on October 1 conditions, Kansas's 2022 corn production is forecast at 592 million bushels, down 21% from last year's production, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Area to be harvested for grain, at 5.15 million acres, is down 5% from a year ago. Yield is forecast at 115 bushels per acre, down 24 bushels from last year.

Sorghum for grain is forecast at 133 million bushels, down 50% from last year. Area for harvest, at 3.10 million acres, is down 9% from 2021. Yield is forecast at 43 bushels per acre, down 35 bushels

Soybean production is forecast at 140 million bushels, down 27% from last year. Area for harvest, at 5.00 million acres, is 4% above 2021. Yield is forecast at 28 bushels per acre, down 12 bushels from

Cotton production is forecast at 170,000 bales, down 9% from last year. Acreage for harvest, at 152,000 acres, is up 50,000 acres from 2021. Yield is forecast at 537 pounds per acre, down 343 pounds per acre from a year ago.

Canola production is forecast at 3.78 million pounds, down 52% from last year. Acreage for harvest is forecast at 7,000 acres, up 500 acres from a year ago. Yield is forecast at 540 pounds per acre, down 660 pounds per acre from 2021.

All sunflower production is forecast at 55.0 million pounds, up 4% from last year. Acreage for harvest, at 44,000 acres, is up 11,000 acres from 2021. Yield is forecast at 1,250 pounds per acre, down 350 pounds per acre from a year ago. Of the acres for harvest, nonoil sunflowers account for 14,000 acres and oil sunflowers account

Alfalfa hay production, at 2.17 million tons, is down 13% from last year. Area for harvest, at 700,000 acres, is up 1% from a year ago. Yield of 3.10 tons per acre is down 0.5 ton from 2021.

All other hay production, at 2.80 million tons, is down 15% from last year. Area for harvest, at 2.00 million acres, is unchanged from a year ago. Yield of 1.40 tons per acre is down 0.25 ton from 2021.

AFBF Sets Farm Bill Priorities

The American Farm Bureau Federation today released its priorities for what may be the most consequential legislation for agriculture in 2023 – renewal of the farm bill. The priorities were identified by a working group of Farm Bureau members and staff from across the country.

AFBF's overarching priorities include:

- Continuing current farm bill program funding
- Maintaining a unified farm bill that includes nutrition programs and farm programs together
- Prioritizing risk management tools that include federal crop insurance and commodity programs
- Ensuring adequate USDA staffing and resources to provide technical assistance

The priorities include more than 60 recommendations over multiple titles of the farm bill including reference price increases for commodities, more transparency for milk checks, funding for conservation programs, rural development, and streamlining of nutrition programs to get food to those who need it most. KDA Offers Cost Share Funds for **Irrigation Technology**

The Kansas Department of Agriculture's Division of Conservation has partnered with the Kansas Groundwater Management District 4 (GMD 4) to offer funds to assist landowners in that district with irrigation efficiency technology.

The GMD 4 Irrigation Technology Initiative is designed to promote irrigation efficiency by providing cost-share assistance to landowners who invest in conservation practices by purchasing technology including automated soil moisture probes, mobile drip irrigation systems, autonomous pivot systems, remote monitoring systems, and more. This project is funded through the Kansas Water Plan with additional funding from GMD 4.

Applications for the cost share funds will be accepted beginning October 17, 2022, and will be approved on a first-come, first-served basis through February 2023 or until all funds have been allocated. Only land located within GMD 4 will be eligible for this initiative.

GMD 4 includes all or parts of 10 counties in northwest Kansas and comprises nearly 5,000 square miles. It is governed by a locally elected board representing landowners and water users. GMD 4 has actively worked toward water conservation in the district, including establishing a Local Enhanced Management Area (LEMA) to set goals and control measures to aid in water

Applications for cost share funds must be made through local conservation districts; please contact your conservation district for details about funding eligibility. Kansas Crop **Progress** and Condition

For the week ending October 16, 2022, there were 6.6 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

Topsoil moisture supplies rated 58% very short, 30% short, 12% adequate, and 0% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies

rated 59% very short, 30% short, 11% adequate, and 0% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat planted was 64%, behind 73% last year, and near 66% for the five-year average. Emerged was 33%, behind 45% last year and 44% average.

Corn harvested was 73%, near 74% last year, but ahead of 64% average.

Soybean condition rated 25% very poor, 26% poor, 28% fair, 19% good, and 2% excellent.

Soybeans dropping leaves was 90%, near 89% last year, and equal to average. Harvested was 45%, ahead of 39% last year and 34% average.

Sorghum condition rated 20% very poor, 33% poor, 30% fair, 16% good, and 1% excellent.

Sorghum mature was 83%, near 87% last year and 84% average. Harvested was 39%, near 42% last year, but ahead of 28% average.

Cotton condition rated 11% very poor, 41% poor, 31% fair, 16% good, and 1% excellent. Cotton bolls opening was 88%, near 89% last year, but ahead of 83% average. Harvested was 26%, well ahead of 3% last year and 4% average.

Sunflowers harvested was 32%, behind 38% last year, but ahead of 24% average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 47% very poor, 29% poor, 18% fair, 6% good, and 0% excellent.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5022

A PROPOSITION to amend sections 2 and 5 of article 9 of the constitution of the state of Kansas to require that a sheriff be elected in each county for a term of four years.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein: Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Sections 2 and 5 of article 9 of the constitution of the state of Kansas are hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 2. County and township officers. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), each county shall elect a sheriff for a term of four years by a majority of the qualified electors of the county voting thereon at the time of voting designated for such office pursuant to law in effect on January 11, 2022, and every four years thereafter.

(b) The provisions of subsection (a) shall not apply to a county that abolished the office of sheriff prior to January 11, 2022. Such county may restore the office of sheriff as provided by law and such restoration shall be irrevocable. A county that restores the office of sheriff shall elect a sheriff by a majority of the qualified electors of the county voting thereon for a term of four years. Such sheriff shall have such qualifications and duties as provided by law. The time of voting for the office of sheriff may be provided for by the legislature pursuant to section 18 of article 2 of this constitution.

(c) The filling of vacancies and the qualifications and duties of the office of sheriff shall be as provided by law.

(d) The legislature shall provide for such other county and township officers as may be necessary.

"§ 5. Removal of officers. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), all county and township officers may be removed from office, in such manner and for such cause, as shall be prescribed by law.

(b) A county sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office by recall election pursuant to section 3 of article 4 of this constitution or a writ of quo warranto initiated by the attorney general."

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. This amendment would preserve the right of citizens of each county that elected a county sheriff as of January 11, 2022, to continue electing the county sheriff. The amendment would also provide that a county sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office pursuant to either a recall election or a writ of quo warranto initiated by the attorney

"A vote for this proposition would preserve the right of citizens of each county that elected a county sheriff as of January 11, 2022, to continue electing the county sheriff via popular vote. The amendment would also direct that a county sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office pursuant to either a recall election or a writ of quo warranto initiated by the attorney

"A vote against this proposition would not make any changes to the constitution and would retain current law concerning the election of a sheriff and the procedures for involuntary removal of a sheriff

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in November in the year 2022, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5014

A PROPOSITION to amend article 1 of the constitution of the state of Kansas by adding a new section thereto, concerning oversight by the legislature of certain executive branch actions.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Article I of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as

follows: "§ 17. Legislative oversight of administrative rules and regulations.

Whenever the legislature by law has authorized any officer or agency within the executive branch of government to adopt rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law, the legislature may provide by law for the revocation or suspension of any such rule and regulation, or any portion thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the members then elected or appointed and qualified in each house.'

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole: Explanatory statement. The purpose of this amendment is to provide

the legislature with oversight of state executive branch agencies and officials by providing the legislature authority to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations.

A vote for this proposition would allow the legislature to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations that are adopted by state executive branch agencies and officials that have the force and effect of law.

A vote against this proposition would allow state executive branch agencies and officials to continue adopting rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law without any opportunity for the legislature to directly revoke or suspend such rules and regulations."

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in the year 2022, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.
