Let's talk a little about God's view of prayer, and how it is different a lot of times from our view of prayer. Because, I think there are times when we are praying, and things don't always turn out the way we want, that makes us question our relationship with God. If that is happening, or it has ever happened, then we have missed the point of prayer entirely.

Our view of prayer tends to be somewhat formulaic. If X happens, then we pray Y, Z should be the result. This way of thinking has spawned many books, and entire churches, that if you pray correctly, then God is obligated to respond in a certain way. These things are almost always best understood by looking at an example. Let's say that you are experiencing some financial hardship. The modern Christian would pray that God would provide a way for that hardship to be removed, or at least relieved, so that we could stop freaking out about money, and be better able to focus on God. I have

heard many people praying this way, and I really don't think there is any problem at all in asking for those things. Where we get into trouble is when God doesn't respond the way we think He should. Perhaps we have been praying this way for a while now, and no financial aid has come. We are just as burdened or maybe more burdened financially than ever before. What does that say about God? What does that say about us, and what does that say about the relationship between God and ourselves? The fact that we pray, and ask, and God seems to remain silent, can make us question our faith, or worse, whether God is listening, or even worse than that, whether or not God even exists.

I believe that God is missional in His thinking. Let me explain that a little. The last thing Jesus said on Earth was for us to go forth and make disciples of all nations and people groups. That's the mission. The gospels give us insight into how we can do it, the New Testament letters give us examples to follow, and the Old Testament shows us why we need to be doing it. The key component to making disciples, and inviting people to a life of faith is the Holy Spirit, and the power of the Holy Spirit dwells within us. Everyone with me so far? That means that we are saved people, whom God is perfecting, while we live in a broken world that is filled

with sin. Our mission, is to invite people to come to a relationship with God and be cleared of the ravages of sin in our lives, and in our world. Alone, we are powerless against it, but through the power of the Holy Spirit, we can overcome it. So, in God's eyes, the things we pray for, should be in line with that mission. This is different than what we are used to but only by a few degrees. God wants us to pray for our finances, but only if the relief of our financial burden is going to free us up to accomplish the mission. He wants us to be free from disease, and sickness, but only if that will help us accomplish the mission. If the mission is better served by us being broke, then so be it, if it is better served in our sickness, so be it. God's primary goal, is that lost people would be found, that is the greatest miracle, and the driving force behind our faith.

Does God heal people? Absolutely! Does God bless people financially? All the time! Are there situations when it is better that we remain uncomfortable so that God's glory can be displayed in us and through us? Yes, there are. Sometimes our greatest blessings in ministry, are the times where we suffered the most, and God taught us, that we don't need money, we don't need our health, we don't need comfort, all we really need is God. He is enough, in sickness, and in health, in poverty and in riches, in suffering and in comfort.

Let me leave you this week, with a few words from the apostle Paul. "Not that I am speaking of being in need, for I have learned in whatever situation I am to be content. I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me." AMEN

The Kitchen Cabinet

Savory Dishes
Mayonnaise dressing may be varied by adding different chipped vegetables, stirring them into the dressing before adding the whipped cream. A fourth of a cupful of pimentos washed and put through a sieve with a wooden spoon; add to a cupful of mayonnaise dressing and serve it with fish.

Louis Salad - Cut canned or fresh pineapple in strips an inch long and a fourth of an inch wide and thick; cut two apples in the same manner and squeeze overt them the juice of half a lemon. Cut heart stalk of celery in the same way and have an equal quantity of each ingredient. Mix with mayonnaise and serve in heart leaves of lettuce.

Mayonnaise with copped pickle and capers with some onion and parsley is another good fish sauce.

Chocolate Pie - Scald two cupfuls of milk, mix together

a half-cupful of sugar and a fourth of a cupful of corn starch and a pinch of salt; stir into the hot milk, cook 15 minutes, then add two squares of melted chocolate; beat the yolks of two eggs, add a fourth of a cupful of sugar to them, and turn into the mixture. Fill a baked shell with the chocolate mixture and cover with a meringue made of the whites of the eggs, two tablespoonfuls of sugar and a half teaspoonful of vanilla. Set in the oven until it has browned to a pale amber shade.

Cheese sauce prepared by making a white sauce, using two tablespoonfuls of butter and two of flour; cook together, then add a cupful of rich milk, and when smooth and free from lumps, add a half-cupful of grated cheese. Serve this with poached eggs, after seasoning well.

A Day of Dates
Dates are so well liked and are not costly fruit, which

should make them more commonly used. A few stuffed dates, stuffed with peanuts or any other nut meats well liked, then rolled in sugar, will furnish a most wholesome and economical dessert and one which need not be refused to the small people.

Date Gems - Sift together five cupfuls of flour and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a teaspoonful of cinnamon and two teaspoonfuls of butter over the fire in a saucepan, when the butter is soft, stir and beat for ten minutes, adding one cupful of milk. Add the dry ingredients and a half-cupful of well-floured dates. Bake in buttered gem pans.



Scientists at UCLA found that chronic stress results in increased secretion of cortisol, which raises blood pressure and the immune system's ability to fight off infection. A stress headache study in Germany showed a 6.3% increase in the average number of headaches among participants during periods of

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending May 28, 2017, temperatures were two to six degrees below normal across the State, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The southern half of the State was mostly dry, while areas in the north received up to two inches of rain. Hail in northwestern Kansas damaged some wheat and recently planted spring crops. There were 4.0 days suitable for fieldwork. Topsoil moisture rated 0 percent very short, 2 short, 80 adequate, and 18 surplus. Subsoil moisture rated 0 percent very short, 3 short, 87 adequate, and 10 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 9 percent very poor, 16 poor, 30 fair, 38 good, and 7 excellent. Winter wheat headed was 97 percent, near 98 last year and the five-year average of 93. Coloring was 39 percent, near 37 last year, but ahead of 34 average.

Corn condition rated 2 percent very poor, 8 poor, 35 fair, 52 good, and 3 excellent. Corn planted was 82 percent, behind 94 last year and 93 average. Emerged

was 64 percent, behind 73 last year and 74 average.

Soybeans planted was 41 percent, ahead of 25 last year, but behind 46 average. Emerged was 24 percent, ahead of 14 last year, but near 25 average.

Sorghum planted was 11 percent, near 13 last year, and behind 23 average.

Cotton planted was 32 percent, ahead of 9 last year, but near 36 average.

Sunflowers planted was 7 percent, near 3 last year and 11 average.

Alfalfa hay condition rated 0 percent very poor, 4 poor, 25 fair, 63 good, and 8 excellent. First cutting was 53 percent complete, ahead of 43 last year.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 0 percent very poor, 2 poor, 15 fair, 67 good, and 16 excellent.

Stock water supplies were 0 percent very short, 1 short, 87 adequate, and 12 surplus.

Data for this release were provided at the county level by USDA Farm Service agency and KSU Extension Service.

Export Report

Net export sales commitments were flat this week as China offset existing commitments with new purchases of 1.9 million bushels. Shipments were strong, however, with China and Mexico taking delivery of 1.9 million bushels. These shipments bring total deliveries of U.S. sorghum to China to 127 million bushels or 57 percent of the USDA export target and 26 percent of the 2016/17 crop. Basis on the Gulf was firm with sorghum bids for July delivery at 114 percent of corn or \$4.59. River bids were firm as well.

Crop Update

By week's end, 37 percent of the sorghum was planted, slightly ahead of last year but 4 percentage points behind the 5-year average. Sorghum planting progress was behind the 5-year average in all estimating states except Arkansas, South Dakota, and Texas.

Women in Farming Workshop

The Kansas Rural Center invites women farmers or want-to-be-farmers, women landowners, and women interested in sustainable farming, food production and local food initiatives to attend a Women in Farming Workshop on Saturday, June 10, 2017. This all-day, women-only workshop and farm tour will be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Palmer Community Center, (203 N Indiana St., Palmer, KS), and two nearby farms.

KRC's Community Food Solutions Program Director, giving an overview of state-level and community-based local food initiatives. She will provide an overview of the "Feeding Kansas" report and recommendations, a report that has informed the development of local food policy councils and developed into KRC's work this year in supporting local food capacity in southwest Kansas.

• Joanna Voigt, beekeeper and KRC's Communications and Pollinator Program Coordinator, will

present on pollinators on the farm. She will explain why pollinators are important on the farm (and elsewhere) and will highlight farming practices that are beneficial to pollinator populations.

• Tom Buller, longtime organic farmer and K-State Research and Extension's Douglas County Horticulture Agent. He will share an introduction to growing specialty crops in hoop houses and give guidance on using row covers and hoop houses to extend the growing and market seasons. Buller authored the in-depth "Growing Under Cover: A Kansas Grower's Guide" with KRC in 2016, and will review the report's findings and provide copies to attendees.

Following the presentations and a catered lunch, attendees will head to nearby Sunny Day Farms, owned and operated by Lucinda Stuenkel (1835 Parallel Road, Palmer, Kansas). The group will tour the farm's grass-fed and grass-finished cattle operation. Stuenkel practices intensive rotational grazing, has incorporated cover crops, and is beginning to add in pollinator strips. Her farm has received numerous conservation grants and awards, including a pasture-management award and rangeland-management award.

Following the Sunny Day Farms tour, attendees will drive about 15 miles to Jay and Linda Sleichter's farm (1282 21st Road, Clay Center, Kansas). On less than five acres, the family has six high tunnels and grows fresh produce nearly year-round, including hundreds of tomato plants in nearly every color, shape and size. The family also sells a selection of homemade jellies. Directions to both farms will be provided at the event.

Be sure to dress for the weather: Wear sturdy shoes that can get muddy and bring sun protection. Don't forget a water bottle!

Saturday's workshop and farm tour requires an RSVP. A \$15 registration fee covers lunch, the farm tour hosts, and materials.

Roots and Chutes

The Root... "Are your boxwoods brown?"

Do you have boxwoods planted in your home landscape? And are they brown this spring? The last winter was pretty tough on boxwoods, particularly the -20°F low we experienced in mid-December. This caused many boxwoods to show winter injury with large portions of the plants turning brown this spring. The severity of the injury depends on a number of characteristics of your boxwoods like the variety, proximity to your home, previous condition, and more. If your boxwoods are partially brown, pruning is the best thing you can do for them. Pruning should be done at the height of the lowest green growth on the plant. For example, if you have green growth on your boxwood at 8 inches and 10 inches, prune the entire plant back to 8 inches. If you have a line of boxwoods, you can prune the entire line back to the lowest green growth. Finally, if your boxwoods are lacking green growth and scraping back a layer of bark indicates no green tissue, it's time to replace them. Many boxwoods are moderately hardy in our environment, so picking the correct variety and placing them in the correct location are extremely important. For information on recommended varieties and planting, visit your local Twin Creeks District office.

The Chute... "Basics of Rotational Grazing"

When you're thinking about rotational grazing, the first things that might come to mind are step-in fence posts and electric polytape. Rotational grazing doesn't have to be that intensive, however. Implementing some of the basic rotational grazing principles in your larger, extensive systems can help improve your pastures with limited additional management.

Rotational grazing management is often boiled down to 3 key components; 1) frequency, 2) intensity and timing, and 3) duration of grazing. Frequency refers to the amount of rest a pasture receives between grazing intervals. In general, longer rest (except to the point of excessiveness) provides your grass with the greatest

opportunity for regrowth. The more time grasses have to regrow after grazing leads to a larger root system to support plants during winter and subsequent regrowth.

Intensity and timing refers to the amount of biomass taken during grazing and when grazing occurred. In most situations, you should leave 50% of the available biomass at any one time. However, you may want to leave more or less depending on your current weather pattern and what time of year the pasture is grazed. For instance, plants require larger energy stores to survive the winter, so leaving excess vegetation behind in the fall can be a good opportunity to insure the winter hardiness of your grass species.

Timing of grazing should also be monitored in terms of consecutive years. Grazing the same pastures at the same time every year can lead to species composition changes. For example, if you're grazing one pasture in the early summer every year, a grass that is most palatable at that time will be continually consumed, giving it a competitive disadvantage to plants that happen to be less palatable during that time. In essence, try not to graze the same pasture at the same time year after year.

Finally, duration of grazing refers to the amount of time cattle are in a particular pasture. You're looking for a balance between utilization of the available forage and minimal harm to plant species. Grouping cattle in larger numbers with more frequent moves between pastures helps to decrease animal selectivity, meaning one species has less chance of continuous grazing. Not only does this help your pasture, but it helps to provide your cattle with a more even diet throughout the grazing season.

Like almost anything in life, success following a rotational grazing strategy is directly linked to the amount of planning and management you are willing to do. Creating a basic grazing plan using these principles can help get you started in the right direction. However, continuous observation of animal condition and pasture composition is necessary to make changes as needed. As Dr. Walt Fick once told me, range management is both a science and an art.

Hoxie FFA Member Vies for State Office

A member of the Hoxie FFA Chapter is among the 14 candidates running for a state officer position to represent more than 9,000 Kansas FFA members for the 2017-2018 term. Skyler Denio will complete an intense process of interviews, tests and public speaking demonstrations this week as part of the 89th Kansas FFA State Convention on the Kansas State University campus.

An appointed nominating committee of former state officers and agricultural education instructors interviews the candidates. On Friday, June 2, the committee will submit its nomination of 10 candidates to the state convention delegates, which consists of two members from each of the 186 chapters in the state. After hearing the candidates present a final prepared speech, the delegates will elect the six members who will serve as the 2017-2018 state officer team. The new team will be announced and installed at the final session of the convention Friday afternoon.

The committee evaluates the candidates on their applications, a written test, writing exercises, and five rounds of interviews. These include one-on-one interviews, delivering a speech, facilitating a workshop, round-robin interviews and a personal interview round.

Once elected, the officers will travel across the state promoting agricultural science education and FFA.
