Twenty-five years ago Fire Chief Kerry Green and the Jennings Fire Department decided to sponsor an afternoon of fun and games for local children. That modest Fun Day has grown into an entire day of fun and games for kids as well as a time of enjoyment for adults. Always celebrated on the fourth Saturday of August, it serves as a fundraiser for the fire department as well as a recruitment opportunity for new volunteers. The event continues to grow each year.

The day begins with a book sale at the local library and a health fair in the Senior Center sponsored by Decatur Health Systems, Family Practice Clinic and Decatur Co. EMS. The health fair is one of the least expensive, most comprehensive health fairs in the state. For utmost accuracy, the tests should be done before eating. However, all participants are encouraged to drink water freely prior to testing.

Amy Vacura, Essential Massage, Norton, will be offering free massages. Decatur County EMS will offer free blood pressure and blood sugar screenings. Kolaches, coffee and iced tea, sponsored by the Jennings United Methodist Church, will be available at the Senior Center during the health fair.

Approximately 130 dozen kolaches, a Czech pastry, with apple, apricot, peach, prune, poppy seed, cottage cheese, and cherry fillings will be available for sale at 8:00 in the former Opera House/Masonic Hall. They sell rapidly, so come early or preorder by calling Dorothy

Vacura (785-678-8133) or Marge Hartzog (785-678-3010). Pre-orders may be submitted until Wednesday evening and may be picked up Thursday evening by arrangement. There will also be a Craft Fair in the former Opera House/Masonic Hall from 9:00 to 3:00 PM, and a bake sale by the American Legion will open in the Legion Hall at 9:00 AM. To reserve an indoor or outdoor booth for the craft fair, contact Vi Krizek, 785-678-7015 or Marge Hartzog.

Events for the children's enjoyment begin at 10:30 AM with a petting zoo by John and Taylor Meitl, New Almelo; a Giant Slide, sponsored by the Jennings Lion Club and Decatur County Financial

Services; and train rides by Greg Otter, Lenora. A cake walk, sponsored by Mary Wahlmeier, will begin in the City Hall at 10:00. Other children's events include an Inflatable slide and Bouncy House by Jump-a-Rama, Colby; a dunk tank, coin search, funnel cakes, and sno-cones. New this year, to celebrate the 25th anniversary, will be Hines Walking Water Balls and Brad Keith providing rides in a Monster Truck provided by Teel Trucks, Hays KS. A signed parental waiver is required for the child to ride. All rides are free of charge, thanks to the Jennings Fire Department and area sponsors.

At 11:00, the newly chartered Jennings Sons of the American Legion will conduct a flag education/presentation at the Legion Hall. Taps will be played by SAL Jim Gallentine. They will

also open the festivities of the day with a flag raising at 8:30 AM, and a flag lowering at sunset in conjunction with the American Legion. Bingo starts at 11:00 AM in the Sunflower Senior Center.

Line-up for the parade begins at noon at the former school site on South Penn. Pre-registration is not necessary. All individuals, floats, vehicles, machinery, and animals are welcome and encouraged to participate. Queen candidates must register at the parade site prior to the parade. The Jennings, Oberlin, Norton and other neighboring American Legion squadron members, as well as American Legion Riders of Norton and Oberlin, and the Jennings Sons of the American Legion will lead the parade. Queen candidates will be introduced to the crowd during the parade. Former Jennings Firemen

Fun Day Queens will also ride in the parade and will be introduced. Following the parade, viewers may vote for their favorite candidates at the speaker's stand until 4:30. Rylee Green of Hays is the reigning 2015 Queen.

All children 12 years and younger may sign up for a drawing for a free girl's or boy's bike and helmet provided by the Jennings Fire Dept and Jennings EMS. Recipients must be present to win. The drawing will be held at approximately 4:30 PM.

A state-sanctioned tractor pull, sponsored by Great Northwest Insurance, will be held in the afternoon following the parade for ages 4-12. A firemen's team barrel competition will follow. The wobble trap shoot of past years will not be held this year.

Firemen's t-shirts showcasing area business

and farmers supporting the Jennings Fire Department and commemorating the 25th Annual Firemen's Fun Day will be sold for \$15 near the fire house during the Fun Day festivities. Proceeds will benefit the fire department. The t-shirts may be viewed on Nex-Tech cable TV. For advance orders, contact Marge Hartzog.

A locally grown hog barbecue begins at 5:00 PM, followed by the crowning of the 2016 Firemen Fun Day Queen. A large auction of merchandise donated by area merchants, with auctioneer Mike Weimer, Hoxie, and a street dance with Mobile Music Express, Oberlin, will conclude the evening.

This year's theme, "25 Years of Service and Fun" shows the fire department's commitment to the community. There are currently 16 members on the fire department. In recent years there have been several upgrades to the Jennings Rural and City fleet of equipment. In 2011, a 1994 9200 International 5500-gallon water truck was purchased, partially with funds from past Firemen Fun Day events. More recently, Decatur County provided the Jennings Rural Fire Department with a 2016 550 Ford Pumper truck and Jennings City, with the assistance of a grant from Dane G. Hansen, purchased a 1987 GMC/E-One Top Kick pumper tanker with a 750 GPM Pump and a 1500-gallon tank in order to meet insurance requirements regarding the size of the pump. The services of the volunteer fire department and the upgrade of equipment help keep insurance costs lower for the area. All this equipment will be available for viewing at the Firemen's Fun Day.

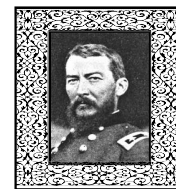

- Kansas State Assessments will be 60% shorter than in the past and allow for USD 412 to decide locally how to assess our students needs.
- MAP "Measures of Academic Progress" testing will be introduced to all students 3-11 in math and reading. This will allow USD 412 to track students' growth over time and give detailed information to parents on the needs of each student.
- It is certainly an exciting time in Kansas education and I can't think of a staff and community more prepared to keep meeting the needs of all our students. Annual Hansen Scholarship Program Announced

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation will make 280 scholarships available in five categories to students in 26 Northwest Kansas counties for the 2016-2017 academic year. Students from an accredited high school, registered independent, private or home school in one of the following 26 counties are eligible to apply:

Cheyenne, Cloud, Decatur, Ellis, Ellsworth, Gove, Graham, Jewell, Lincoln, Logan, Mitchell, Norton, Osborne, Ottawa, Phillips, Rawlins, Republic, Rosks, Russell, Saline, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Thomas, Trego and Wallace.

Scholarships available for students who will graduate in the current academic year are:

Ten **Leaders of Tomorrow** Scholarships with annual stipends of \$10,000 renewable for three additional years if criteria established by the Scholarship Committee are met. Recipients must attend an accredited four-year public, private or church related Kansas college or university.

Fifty **Hansen Scholarships** with stipends of \$6500 renewable for three additional years if criteria established by the Scholarship Committee are met. Recipients must attend an accredited four-year public, private or church related Kansas college or university.

One hundred **Hansen Student Scholarships** with stipends of \$4000 renewable for one additional year, providing the recipients have achieved at least a 3.00 GPA at the college level. Recipients must attend an accredited community, public, private or church related college or university in Kansas.

To qualify for the above scholarships, a student must have taken the ACT test and have a composite score of 21 or higher and have at least a 3.50 GPA (unweighted). The student should be an active participant in extracurricular school and community activities, display good citizenship, leadership, and moral integrity.

Students planning to enter the competition for Leaders of Tomorrow, Hansen Scholar or Hansen Student scholarships must register at their school and take the qualifying test

at locations to be announced. Information on all scholarships has been sent to qualifying area schools. Tentative test dates have been set for September 14th and 15th, 2016.





Back To School With Good Food

With school starting across Kansas this unfortunately can mean the return of unhealthy lunches which can certainly be labeled as fast food, most of which come to schools shipped in already prepared packaging. If you have or have had children in school, you know what I mean. Beanies, weenies, chicken nuggets, high-carb mac and cheese, fried snacks and sugary soft drinks are popular fare served at school cafeterias across the Wheat State. Still, school lunch programs can play a key role in teaching and reinforcing healthy eating behaviors by integrating activities like on-site gardens, nutrition education, locally sourced foods and endeavors that affirm the value of mealtime. You don't have to have eagle eyes to see this nation has a problem with obesity and that challenge has spread to this country's youngsters. Did you know approximately 17 percent of U.S. children and adolescents aged 2-19 are obese, according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control?

That's nearly triple the amount in 1980. It's time we turn this train around. Initiatives that connect our youth to fresh, healthy foods, a healthy lifestyle with plenty of exercise and healthy eating habits will go a long way toward changing this obesity epidemic. What's happening here may seem more difficult than it really is. Looking back in our not too distant past, many Americans ate a balanced diet consisting of plenty of fruits, vegetables, grains and protein. Eating healthy isn't easy, but it isn't impossible either. It does take discipline, restraint and the willingness to make life-altering changes in what have become bad-choice, unhealthy eating habits. What better place to begin than with the future of our youngsters? Talk about an idealistic endeavor. Let's begin with one of the most important steps - connecting local farmers to schools. In communities across Kansas, local food

Immunizations Offer Protection for All Stages of Life

August is immunization Awareness Month and is a great time to find out which vaccines you and your need to be protected at different ages and stages in life. Immunization typically starts at birth. At 2 months old, infants start receiving a series of six primary immunizations that protect against disease.

These diseases can be spread in a variety of ways. Flu and other diseases spread through the air or on surfaces. Hepatitis B is spread through exposure to infectious blood or bodily fluids. Rotavirus is spread when the virus is shed by an infected person and then enters another person's mouth. Babies frequently use their mouths to explore the world around them, so this vaccine is extremely important. For more information, visit the Rotavirus page on Health.mil. Some vaccines require multiple doses for lifelong protection. These may start in infancy and continue in later stages of childhood. Toddlers and school-age children typically get immunized again for Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR), Hepatitis A and chickenpox. Recommendations for middle school aged and older kids include vaccines to enhance protection against tetanus, diphtheria

and pertussis, and protect against meningitis and human papillomavirus (HPV). HPV is a leading cause of cervical and other cancers. More vaccines may be needed during adulthood based on factors like age, occupation, lifestyle, high-risk medical conditions, type and locations of travel, and previous vaccine history. For older beneficiaries, vaccines are available and recommended to protect against pneumonia and other infections, as well as shingles, a very painful condition caused by the same virus as chickenpox. TRICARE covers, at no cost, age-appropriate doses of vaccines as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). For more information, visit the TRICARE website. Through the expanded TRICARE pharmacy vaccine program, you may receive certain covered vaccines for zero copayment at participating network pharmacies. For more information, call Express Scripts at 1-877-363-1303 or search for participating pharmacies online. producers provide beef, lamb, pork, poultry, fruits, grains and vegetables at local markets or directly from their farms.

Why can't they provide farm-fresh foods for our school children?

Well this is happening - and right here in Kansas. In Clark County, in southwestern Kansas, local stockmen donate cattle to help feed students at Ashland High School. This generous contribution is known as the USD 220 beef program.

Between 15 and 20 livestock producers pledged to provide beef for this new program. With this many contributors, each producer donates one animal every two years.

This new strategy, allows the school district hopes to significantly reduce its food costs, engage the community, reward livestock producers and provide for its students.

Another program I recently read about includes the state of Vermont. Here a successful farm to school movement throughout the last 10 years has aided school lunch programs from state money. Nearly 60 percent of the schools have participated. Children of Vermont have benefited with farm-fresh foods and local farmers have expanded their business into a market worth more than \$40 million.

School gardens can provide hands-on opportunities for children to cultivate and grow their own food. In high poverty areas of north Texas, school gardens not only nurture healthy lifestyles and respect for the environment, they can also provide academic achievement through the primary experiences of gardening. Nutritional education should be a part of every public school in this country. So funding is tight. That's a given. What if we engaged professional volunteers to run a broad range of topics that address nutrition?

You know, farmers and ranchers, agri-business types

and maybe even people with nutritional backgrounds.

Our goal should be to feed our children while they are in school, but feed them with nutritious meals that will help them grow up to be healthy, well-adjusted adults. It's time to cut back on a diet that focuses on processed foods delivered in boxes.

Children spend seven to eight hours nine to 10 months out of every year in schools across our nation. These same schools have our children under their wing more time than we as parents and grandparents during each day school is in session. Let's reverse this trend of snacking and eating less than nutritious foods in our school systems. Your children, grandchildren and mine deserve the best and healthiest foods available - fresh, locally produced and made from scratch served up at their schools.

EMT Class Beginning Soon



In January 1972, a mid-season replacement television show aired. "Emergency" told the story of the newly-created Paramedic Rescue Unit attached to Fire Station 51. We were introduced to two "paramedics" who provided emergency medical care in the field, working in conjunction with medical personnel at Rampart General Hospital. This was an innovative concept, and had a great amount of influence on public perception of the newly created field of Emergency Medical Services. When critical medical care was provided early in a situation, the outcomes were much better.

Fast forward to 2016. The word "paramedic" is a regular part of our vocabulary now, and most people are familiar with EMT's-the Emergency Medical Technicians-who respond to a 911 call. EMT's respond to medical issues, traumatic injuries, and accident scenes, and provide the first response to those in need of medical care. They work closely with medical personnel to provide critical care and transport for those patients who are in need. The revolutionary vision of the 1970's is now commonplace, and in Sheridan County, that EMT who responds to the 911 call is your neighbor,

relative, or someone like you.

Sheridan County EMS is hosting a semester program to provide participants with opportunities to gain information, skills and attitudes necessary for certification and practice as Emergency Medical Technicians in the state of Kansas. The class will meet on Monday and Thursday evenings from 6-10 pm at the EMS building on East Highway 24 in Hoxie. The program has been approved by the Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services. If you are interested in joining the class, or want to learn more, please call Deb Kaufman at 675-3364, or email her at sdcoems@hotmail.com. The last date to join the class is the first of September.

A Brief History of Emergency Medical Services

EMS in America can be traced back to the Civil War era. All military personnel had to be examined by medical officers to qualify for duty. Also, ambulances were assigned based on the size of the regiment. Each ambulance team was trained in patient care to better take care of the soldiers. In 1865, Cincinnati incorporated the first civilian ambulance. Then, in 1869, New York City advertised

a 30 second response time and provided an Ambulance Surgeon and a quart of brandy for their patients!

During World War I, signal boxes were used by injured soldiers to assist medical teams in locating them in the field of battle. Medical teams also used electric, steam, and gasoline powered carriages for transporting the injured. It was also the first war to utilize traction splints and other medical equipment. After the war, civilian ambulances carrying surgeons were equipped with radio dispatchers to better serve the community.

The transition to what we know as the modern day, EMS started during the 1950's as an off shoot of 5 different types of businesses; towing operators, medical equipment companies, funeral homes, hospitals, and police/ fire departments. After many years of being unregulated, funeral homes began patient care and provided nearly half of the country's ambulances.

In 1960, John F. Kennedy declared that "Traffic accidents constitute one of the greatest, perhaps the greatest, of the nation's public health problems." Then in 1966, Lyndon B. Johnson and President's Commission on Highway Safety/National

Academy of Sciences declares the carnage "the neglected disease of modern society." Soon after, the National Highway Traffic Safety Act was adopted which standardized EMS training, promoted state involvement, encouraged community oversight, recommended radio communication, and stressed a single emergency number.

Other federal initiatives were put into action that further helped define the EMS program. In 1972, the Health Services and Mental Health Administration under the Dept. of Health, Education, and Welfare became the lead agency for EMS. Also the Physician Responder Program was implemented, which later morphed into paramedic programs and lead to close physician supervision.

1973 brought about the EMS Systems Act. The DHEW established 300 EMS systems throughout the country. The Department of Transportation adapted training curricula for EMT, EMT P, and first responder. Public Law 93-154 established new rules for EMS radio communications. General Services Administration also introduced ambulance specifications. The next step came in 1981 with the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act which consolidated

funding into state preventive health block grants, eliminated funding under EMSS Act, reduced compliance with federal guidelines, and lastly, abolished the federal lead agency.

In 1996 the EMS Agenda for the Future was drafted, which further connected the EMS with the other medical professions. That same year the EMS Education Agenda for the Future was drafted, which provided recommendations for Core content, Scope of practice and Certification of EMS professionals.

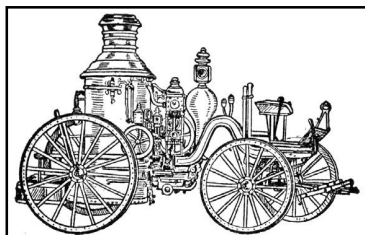

The 5K Run is \$10 for

Competition games are for FHSU students and Hays area businesses who choose to submit teams of six individuals. Competition games include tug of war, egg volleyball, bubble ball soccer and an obstacle course. Prizes will be awarded. Funds raised will help create opportunities for mentors, mentees and the community at large.
