Golden Plains Middle/High School started the 2022-2023 school year on August 18. Along with the excitement of a new year, Golden Plains welcomed six new staff members.

Shanda Brown took the position of middle school science teacher, replacing Russ Aumiller, who retired at the end of the 2021-2022 school year. Ms. Brown grew up on a farm outside of Colby where she graduated high school. After graduation, she attended Fort Hays State University.

While this is Brown's first year teaching at Golden Plains, she has had other teaching experiences including being a Paraeducator in Garden City, substituting for several years, and returning to her hometown to teach Kindergarten for the past 15 years. "I decided to come to Golden Plains because I was ready to be in the classroom with an older group of kids," said Brown. "It has been a good start to the school year, and I am looking forward to continuing getting to know my students and being able to make a positive impact in their lives." In additional to teaching science, Ms. Brown serves the district as ESOL Coordinator.

Jaci Schaben is the new second grade teacher for the elementary school in Selden. Graduating from Golden Plains in 1996, Jaci is a familiar face in the GP community. She attended Fort Hays State University majoring in social work and Wichita State University for education. Before entering the teaching world, Jaci worked at Golden Plains Elementary School as a special education paraeducator for 15 years. All three of Schaben's children have either graduated or are still attending Golden Plains.

"When Mrs. Miller chose to retire this past year from teaching second grade, I just couldn't let the opportunity pass by," said Schaben. "Lori has been so supportive and a great inspiration as I continue on this path. I had the opportunity to work in her classroom as a para many times over the years. I am so excited to now be a second-grade teacher!"

"We have a wonderful staff that has been so supportive and encouraging of this change," continued Schaben. "They are all like family to me. I am extremely happy to be here at GP and feel

very fortunate to have been given this opportunity."

A training workshop for information on Kansas Open Meeting Act (KOMA) and Kansas Open Record Act (KORA) will be held Thursday, September 22, at the Bowen Scout House, 1117 Sheridan Ave., Hoxie, from 10am–2:45pm. Cost for the 'brown bag' event is \$25, so be sure to bring your own lunch. We will eat together while learning about KOMA/KORA. Tea, water, and snacks will be available during the event. This workshop is sponsored by *The Sheridan Sentinel* and Kansas Coalition for Open Government.

The speaker will be Max Kautsch, Kansas Press Association (KPA) Attorney. He will teach about KOMA/KORA and answer any questions attendees may have.

any questions attendees may have.

KOMA applies to state and local public agencies (those related to the government). It does not apply to private entities. The KOMA also applies to any subordinate group formed by such public agencies (e.g. committees, sub-committees, etc.). This means that KOMA applies to state boards, commissions, committees, city councils, county boards of commissioners, township boards, rural water district boards, public library boards, etc. and most groups formed by such entities in order to assist them with public business. The KOMA does not apply to private persons or meetings of private groups such as homeowner's associations, church groups, private clubs, private businesses, political party caucuses, etc. (Source: <a href="https://ag.ks.gov/open-government/koma-church-groups-count-church-groups

KORA applies only to public records, which are records made, maintained, created or possessed by a public agency (i.e., a branch of the state or local government). Deadline to register is Friday, September 16. (Source: https://ag.ks.gov/open-government/kora-face)

# Public Health Offering New Progrms

The Health Department is offering new programs to help the community. The Health Department is trying to find ways to complement the health services offered to our community. We have a great mix of folks who truly care about our community and making it great, and I'm excited to be able to be a part of that. Both of these programs are offered as a free will donation to our community so that cost is not an obstacle to improving health.

The first program is the Healthy Heart Ambassador Program (HHA). This program is a CDC-recognized self-monitoring blood pressure and nutrition education program facilitated by a trained coach through the health department. Participants use blood pressure tracking to inform lifestyle changes. The program lasts four months, has weekly supportive messaging, meets twice a month for a short office visit, and meets monthly for a nutrition education seminar. Eligible participants include those who are 18 years old or older, have a hypertensive diagnosis or are on an antihypertensive medication, and are interested in and ready for the program. The HHA program is not able to help if you have had a significant cardiac event in the last six months, or have atrial fibrillation or another arrhythmia, or have or are at risk for Lymphedema.

The second program that the health department is offering is the Arthritis Foundation Walk with Ease. Although this program is through the Arthritis Foundation, it can benefit anyone wanting to get started with a walking program. Walk with Ease has been shown to reduce pain and discomfort of arthritis, increase balance, strength, and walking pace, build confidence in one's ability to become physically active, and improve overall health. If you can be on your feet for 10 minutes without increased pain, you can have success with Walk with Ease. Group participation is for 18 sessions composed of three meetings per week for six weeks. Sessions last about an hour.





know where the revenue stream is that is going to support the bonds, including the proposed 2.5-3-million-dollar bond they are currently talking about for an Emergency Department remodel. Wes Bainter stated there is a lot of liability for a small hospital and they don't want the hospital to come in and tell them they can't make a bond payment. 
