TAXPAYERS' REPORT

This week, I want to report on the completion of another county road project we have been working on for the past several months. Bridge #46, located two miles east of Hoxie and just south of Hwy. 24, was removed by our Sheridan Road Department.

This bridge was installed in the late 40's or early 50's and had become dangerous for the size of trucks and farm equipment we are using today. This is the second old bridge we have removed and replaced with a full concrete low-water crossing with perimeter footings 4' deep with a 12" thick concrete cap also reinforced with 15,000 feet of reinforcement steel. This will last for at least 60 years and during that time will require little or NO repairs or maintenance or continuing costs to the County.

This project was competed for right at \$60,000 with labor, materials, and suppliers right here in Sheridan County. We have two more old concrete slides that we have on the schedule for replacement yet this year. In total, there are at least eight more old wooden bridges that have become deteriorated and dangerous for bigger and heavier equipment. We will continue to replace these as quickly as we can in order to make our roads safer and more usable to transport our agricultural products.

Joanne Pfannenstiel Emerick - Hoxie, KS

Joanne Pfannenstiel Emerick is a Ness County native who graduated from Ness City High School in 1969 and from Fort Hays State University with a degree in History in 1973. She made Hoxie her home upon her marriage to Hoxie native Dave Emerick in 1983. Their son, Tanner, was born in 1985. Joanne retired from teaching in 2005 after a 31-year teaching career, the last 14 of which were for USD 412, Hoxie.

She is a member of St. Frances Cabrini Catholic Church, Hoxie, and currently serves her parish as a lector. She served over twenty years on the Sheridan County Election Board and volunteered for various posts at the Sheridan County Fair.

In 2007, the Vietnam Memorial Moving Wall came to Hoxie. Joanne planned the opening ceremony and served as Mistress of Ceremonies.

Joanne is best known for her work with area veterans, while also being recognized for her (and her students') historical programs on various topics which have been presented to community groups and civic organizations for decades.

Joanne had two major teaching goals for her Sheridan County students. One was to lead them to share her love of history, to understand it, and to learn from it. Her second goal was to produce students who exhibited civic awareness and responsibility. Most of all, she wanted her students to understand that they have rights, that their voices are important, and she encouraged them - and still does - to stand up for their beliefs. Her hope was that her students would all become registered voters and take an active role in civic affairs.

In her years at Hoxie High School, Joanne was responsible for many Sheridan

Bette James' personal goals and beliefs about teaching are easily defined and very broad. She says, "I am here to prepare human beings for participation in the great experience that is life on this planet - a experience that involves joy and pain, hope and fear, gain and

loss. Every person must somehow learn to know himself or herself, and to find a place in the family of mankind." These beliefs made her a better teacher as she found ways to lead students to these truths through classroom experiences that focused on the basic skills of reading and communication.

Her education began at Hastings College, Hastings, NE from 1956-1958, and then at Fort Hays State University, where she earned her BA in 1965, her MS in 1971, and her Reading Specialist in 1977. She also has earned many more hours of education from other colleges and universities and has participated in a large variety of professional growth activities, memberships and staff development and training.

Bette's teaching experience began in 1958 at Hill City in a second-grade classroom, where she remained for three years. From there, having married and moved to Hoxie, she substituted in Hoxie in all grades for seven years, then taught both elementary and secondary music, beginning in 1968. In 1972, she was offered the position of secondary Title I Developmental Reading Teacher, directing the only secondary Title I reading program in the state of Kansas. In 1981, she added English and Technology to her Reading courses and continued in that program until retirement in 1999. She also taught Outreach Night Classes at Colby Community College. Following retirement, she has engaged in ACT Prep Tutoring from 2012 to the present time.

As a professional she has received numerous awards, and honors, as well as serving in various community positions. She has received several grant awards and served for many years in her church, as well as the community. In the larger community of the State, she had opportunities to give presentations on school profiles and writing and curriculum development as well as QPA at the Kansas Association of School Boards Region Nine Conference. And in the even larger "community" of our world, her family was privileged to host Hoxie's first international exchange student, followed by six more from Guatemala, France, and Japan over the years.

She finds it difficult to define highlights of her career. "Many occurred in only moments, when a student's eyes lit up with understanding. Others were extended rewarding experiences. The career is ongoing even now, as I seemingly don't know how to end it."



SCHC Awarded Tax Credits

\$4.1 million in Community Service Tax Credits (CSP) were awarded to bolster the fundraising efforts of 29 nonprofit organizations across Kansas that improve local access to quality childcare, healthcare, education, arts, and housing. The Kelly Administration continued its ongoing commitment to addressing the childcare shortage by including almost \$1 million specifically for nonprofits that boost the supply of childcare options.

CSP tax credits have been issued in the Sunflower State since 1994. The program provides a 70% tax credit to qualified donors in rural communities (populations less than 15,000) and a 50% tax credit in larger communities. The credits are a direct deduction from the donor's state tax obligation. For example, a donor making a \$1,000 gift in a rural community receives a \$700 tax credit when they file their state taxes, making the net cost to the donor only \$300.

Awarded nonprofits were chosen through a highly competitive, score-based selection process. This year, 29 of the 55 requested projects received CSP funding. Locally, the Sheridan County Health Complex received funds for the renovation and expansion of the Emergency Department to make it code compliant.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5003

A PROPOSITION to amend the bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas by adding a new section thereto stating that there is no constitutional right to abortion, and reserving to the people the ability to regulate abortion through the elected members of the legislature of the state of Kansas.

WHEREAS, This proposition to amend the bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be known and may be cited as the Value Them Both Amendment.

Now, therefore:
 Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: The bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"§ 22. Regulation of abortion. Because Kansans value both women and children, the constitution of the state of Kansas does not require government funding of abortion and does not create or secure a right to abortion. To the extent permitted by the constitution of the United States, the people, through their elected state representatives and state senators, may pass laws regarding abortion, including, but not limited to, laws that account for circumstances of pregnancy resulting from rape or incest, or circumstances of necessity to save the life of the mother."

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. The Value Them Both Amendment would affirm there is no Kansas constitutional right to abortion or to require the government funding of abortion, and would reserve to the people of Kansas, through their elected state legislators, the right to pass laws to regulate abortion, including, but not limited to, in circumstances of pregnancy resulting from rape or incest, or when necessary to save the life of the mother.

"A vote for the Value Them Both Amendment would affirm there is no Kansas constitutional right to abortion or to require the government funding of abortion, and would reserve to the people of Kansas, through their elected state legislators, the right to pass laws to regulate abortion.

"A vote against the Value Them Both Amendment would make no changes to the constitution of the state of Kansas, and could restrict the people, through their elected state legislators from regulating abortion by leaving in place the recently recognized right to abortion."

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives, and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at a special election which is hereby called on August 2, 2022, pursuant to section 1 of article 14 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, to be held in conjunction with the primary election held on such date.

Chasing Clovers: Incentive vs. Entitlement

Incentive vs. Entitlement: A sense of entitlement has crept into our daily lives today. Not just young people, but almost all of us. We feel we have a right to perks that would have been luxuries a hundred years ago—things like air conditioning, indoor toilets, carpeted homes, automobiles, phones, televisions, and entertainment. We expect these realities and complain when we don't get them promptly. We feel they are a right. Whenever we assume something is a right—we tend to lose incentive to earn it.

It's the difference between rights and responsibilities. When we think we are entitled to something, we assume someone will act on our behalf. When we think we are responsible for something, we assume we must act. Often times, the privilege is perceived as a right. People start feeling entitled.

Too often, we've cultivated a sense of entitlement in our young people. They have grown up under our leadership and we fostered it in them. We felt it was our job to give them perks that years ago were items kids worked for. Over time, we stole their incentive. When adult leaders rush to give privileges to our young, we treat those privileges as a right they possess. Thus, they lose incentive to work for it.

When our youth begin to demand, assume, or desire something, we must do a motive check on the situation: who has the greater incentive for benefit - them or you? If it's them, you will diminish their sense of entitlement by leveraging their incentive to get it. If they stand to gain, make that clear.

In a case study with a new experiment at a high school in New Haven, CT, the year ended with "shocking" results: not a single one of the 44 first-time freshmen earned enough credits to move up to sophomore year.

The teachers, newly empowered to break from traditional practices, have begun to reinvent the high school experience by switching freshmen to a self-paced system where kids move up only when they've "mastered" specific skills. The goal is to make sure kids learn something instead of breezing through school with D's. Unlike students at other schools, these 44 kids won't have to repeat their freshman year. They'll get an opportunity to finish their work over a new, four-week summer school. Then, if they need more time, they can start off the year right where they left off, instead of repeating entire classes. The key is they have to earn their progress. The incentive is all theirs.

As we are getting ready to embark on our county fair season in western Kansas, we are reminded that the 4-H youth development program does not focus on the competition element of the county fairs, but the educational aspect that comes from participating in contests and competitions. We all thrive on the rush of a competition and who is crowned the champion. When looking at the path it took to get to the competition, it is the ups and downs, the educational learning opportunities and day to day challenges that ultimately create champions in every participant.

Judging involves opinions. When you exhibit at a fair, you are asking for a second opinion. You have already formed your evaluation or viewpoint about your project work. The judge doesn't always know the problems you had or why you chose to do what you did. Your answers to questions help a judge to better know about your work. You chose to have them evaluate your exhibit when you entered it at the fair. You might not agree and that's OK, but you are not 'entitled' to that purple or blue ribbon. Incentive to do well has earned whatever ribbon color the judge feels is deserved. Remember to be gracious and respect the judge's opinion.

At this point, let's make sure that we are giving our youth incentives to complete their own work. As parents, we many times want our youth to be at the top, but we must remember to step back and make sure that our "assistance" in completing projects doesn't become solely the "work" of the parent. Working together on projects creates a bond between a parent and a child, but for example, maybe the parent could work on their own craft project or foods exhibit to enter in Open Class.

Youth development goals for the Kansas 4-H program are often referred to as Life Skills. Those Life Skills include: Building a Positive Self-Concept, Developing an Inquiring Mind, Relating to Others, Developing Concern for the Community and Learning to Make Decisions.

4-H is not about awards, projects, competitions or money -- 4-H is about helping youth grow and develop as young adults. In our opinion, everyone is a "Winner" -- regardless of the ribbon color. Our goal is to have "Purple Ribbon 4-Hers", not just purple ribbon animals, cakes and dresses. Enjoy the fair season in western Kansas!

As we quickly approach the August 2 primary election, I want to thank our county election officials and poll workers who work tirelessly to ensure the security and integrity of our elections.

Second, I want to remind voters they have multiple options for how to cast their ballot, including in-person on Election Day, advance in-person voting, and advance by mail ballot.

Please remember that state law requires voter identification in every election and when voting in person or by mail. A list of acceptable forms of ID can be found on the Secretary of State's [website](https://www.sos.kansas.gov).

All registered voters are eligible to participate in the primary election. Libertarian and unaffiliated voters will receive a ballot with the non-partisan races in their county, if applicable, and the constitutional amendment. Voters can preview their ballot and verify their polling location on [VoteView](https://www.voteview.com).

Please note the 2022 election dates and deadlines:

- **July 12:** Last day to register to vote for the primary election
- **July 13:** Advance voting in person and by mail may begin
- **August 2:** PRIMARY ELECTION
- **August 5:** Last day for advance by mail ballots to be received (must be postmarked by August 2)

I encourage all registered voters to participate in the August 2 election and exercise their constitutional right to vote.

U.S. Supreme Court Term Good for Liberty, the Rule of Law

The recently concluded U.S. Supreme Court term was a blockbuster for the rule of law, producing important decisions that reinforce the principle that courts are to interpret the law as it actually is written, not as judges or advocates wish it to be.

The highest-profile case of the term was *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health*, which the Court summarized as holding that "[t]he Constitution does not confer a right to abortion ... and the authority to regulate abortion is returned to the people and their elected representatives." This was the right decision, and now the people of Kansas will exercise that authority on August 2 by voting on the Value Them Both amendment, which I support.

But this term saw other similarly important landmark rulings that drew less attention. As attorney general, I appreciated helping litigate these cases for Kansas.

Religious liberty: In several cases, the Supreme Court provided new clarity on how the First Amendment both protects Americans' right to the "free exercise" of religion and forbids the government to "establish" religion. The Court explained that governments may not discriminate by excluding religious schools from a program that otherwise provides public funding to private schools (*Carson v. Makin*). The government also may not discriminate against the religious expression of a public-school football coach who kneels on the field for personal prayer after a game (*Kennedy v. Bremerton School District*). Together, these decisions expand Americans' liberty to exercise religious faith without government interference just as the Constitution expressly provides.

Second Amendment: More than a decade ago, the Supreme Court clarified that the Second Amendment guarantees an individual right to keep firearms in one's home. But only this term did the Court further clarify that the constitutional right to "keep and bear" arms extends outside a person's residence (*New York State Rifle & Pistol Association v. Bruen*). This landmark decision confirms what I long have thought true - Second Amendment rights, like other constitutional rights, are not confined to be exercised only in a person's home.

The federal bureaucracy: In what may prove a highly consequential decision, the Supreme Court held that federal bureaucracies can exercise only powers that Congress gives them, and that Congress must be clear when it intends to delegate major powers (*West Virginia v. EPA*). In other words, the people's elected representatives in Congress, not unelected bureaucrats, make the

law. Reestablishing democratic control over the sprawling federal bureaucracy is, in my view, one of the most important steps we must take to preserve liberty for future generations.

Defense of duly enacted laws: As attorney general, part of my job is to defend laws passed by the Legislature whenever their legality is challenged in court, whether I personally favor a particular law or not. But some activist state officials refuse to defend laws they don't like. The Supreme Court this term made clear that states can make sure their laws are not nullified by government officials who refuse to do their job. For example, when a governor refuses to defend a law, the state may authorize the attorney general to do so (*Cameron v. EMW Women's Surgical Center*). In our system of government, every democratically enacted law deserves a proper legal defense when challenged.

In each of these cases, I was proud to be a part of the winning side - victories for both the rule of law and limited government. In my view, that's good for Kansas. Thank you for the privilege of serving as your Kansas attorney general.

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending July 10, 2022, there were 5.8 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 19% very short, 33% short, 46% adequate, and 2% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 20% very short, 31% short, 47% adequate, and 2% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat harvested was 95%, ahead of 82% last year and 86% for the five-year average.

Corn condition rated 4% very poor, 10% poor, 30% fair, 45% good, and 11% excellent. Corn silking was 34%, equal to last year, and behind 39% average. Dough was 2%, near 3% last year and 5% average.

Soybean condition rated 1% very poor, 7% poor, 30% fair, 50% good, and 12% excellent.

Soybeans emerged was 96%, near 95% last year, and equal to average. Blooming was 16%, well behind 36% last year, and behind 32% average. Setting pods was 1%, near 4% both last year and average.

Sorghum condition rated 3% very poor, 8% poor, 39% fair, 45% good, and 5% excellent.

Sorghum headed was 5%, near 8% last year and 7% average.

Cotton condition rated 0% very poor, 5% poor, 46% fair, 44% good, and 5% excellent. Cotton squaring was 66%, ahead of 59% last year, and well ahead of 45% average. Setting bolls was 5%, near 1% last year and 2% average.

Sunflowers planted was 94%, near 95% last year, and equal to average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 17% very poor, 15% poor, 27% fair, 36% good, and 5% excellent.

Kansas Crop Production Report

Based on July 1 conditions, Kansas's winter wheat production is forecast at 267 million bushels, down 27% from last year, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Average yield is forecast at 39 bushels per acre, down 13 bushels from 2021. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 6.85 million acres, down 2% from a year ago.

Oat production is forecast at 945,000 bushels, down 6% from last year. Average yield is forecast at 45 bushels per acre, down 5 bushels from 2021. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 21,000 acres, up 5% from a year ago.

Under her direction, 75 Hoxie High School students represented Kansas in the contest in Washington, DC in 1995, 1996, and 1997. She took numerous Hoxie High School students to the National History Day Contest at the University of Maryland from 1992-2000. **Many Sheridan County residents played a part in the students' History Day presentations and often were the chief subjects of the programs.** Community-wide open houses that showcased the presentations were well-attended. Joanne believed that valuable learning takes place outside the classroom. She led her Hoxie High School students to the Vietnam Veterans Moving Wall in Oakley, traveled with her Hoxie High School Government students to a Colby Community College lecture by David and Julie Eisenhower (getting a private meeting afterwards), took her Am. Government class to the local courthouse where they viewed the Kansas Court of Appeals hearing cases, and took her seniors to the polls on Election Day.

Commission Minutes

7/5/22

Now on this 5th of July 2022, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Wes Bainter presiding. Others present were Joe Bainter, Mike "Buck" Mader, County Attorney Joe Pratt and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were Carolyn Meyer and *The Sheridan Sentinel*.

At 8:00 a.m. Wes Bainter called the meeting to order.

Those in attendance stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Joe Herskowitz, Road & Bridge Supervisor, came to the table. Herskowitz stated the striping is expected to be started this week on the feedlot road.

There was discussion about the bridge at 100E/60N. After harvest, the bridge will be repaired with planking material until it can be fixed permanently.

A bid was presented from JT Grader Service for road work on 60W/90-160S in the amount of \$6,000. Wes Bainter made a motion to approve the bid seconded by Mader. Carried 3-0

Herskowitz found a 2001 Ford F350 long-bed service pickup for sale in Atwood for \$3,700. By consensus, permission was given to go look at the pickup.

At 8:12, Wes Bainter made a motion to enter into executive session for a period of 10 minutes for the discussion of non-elected personnel. Joe Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0. Present were the Board, Herskowitz, Bracht and Pratt. The door opened at 8:21 with no decision being made.

Pratt discussed the Dispatch Agreement with Logan County. He will make changes and will get the draft to Bracht for distribution to the Board to review.

Pratt discussed the Warranty Deed the Board had approved and signed the previous week for property located in the SE4 of 15-8-28. Pratt discussed how the situation came about that the County donated the property to the Sheridan County Community Foundation (SCCF) Properties LLC. Pratt distributed information he compiled showing the different "county" entities who have received funds from the Sheridan County Community Foundation and the amount received. Wes Bainter stated he and Scott Foote had discussed donating a lot to SCCF for the daycare facility, but the specials made it a deal breaker. Bracht stated that she had reviewed the Minutes and the Board had not discussed donating County land to the Foundation during any prior meeting. Wes Bainter made a motion to donate the property located in the SE4 of 15-8-28 (vacant lot east of the

hospital) to SCCF Properties, LLC. Mader seconded. Carried 2-1.

Wes Bainter stated he had been asked to build the duplex that will be used for the daycare facility. Wes Bainter continued by saying he would be glad to help but he doesn't need the work and if there is someone out there who wants to build a duplex to do so.

Mader made a motion to increase the mileage reimbursement rate to 62.5 cents, which is the new IRS rate. Wes Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0

Wes Bainter made a motion to approve the four Treasurer Abatements seconded by Joe Bainter. Carried 3-0

Mader made a motion to approve the June 28, 2022 Minutes as presented and the July 1, 2022 Payroll. Wes Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0

Guest, Carolyn Meyer was recognized. Meyer stated that there are several clients with Pregnancy Pathways and asked if she would be able to get a key for the main office door and the "WIC" room at Public Health when they have clients they need to visit with. The Board approved Meyer coming and getting the key from the Clerk's Office during normal business hours.

Chad Koster, Kyle Ahlenstorf, and Rebecca Bird from the Sheridan County Health Complex and Monica Reuber from Public Health came to the table. Koster distributed and discussed the proposed new emergency room development. The hospital is hoping the bidding process can begin in the fall. The existing space will be repurposed. Koster stated they will be looking at USDA funding in the amount of \$2,000,000 - \$3,000,000.

Koster advised the Board that the clinic has a mid-level practitioner leaving in August and they are trying to hire back another PA or APRN.

The doctor who saw clients in the Selden Clinic is also leaving. They don't have specific plans yet for the clinic but will try and staff short term.

Ahlenstorf stated the clinic is moving forward with the mobile unit. This will allow clinic staff to go out and provide services to residents in the outlying county.

Bird reviewed the financial report for the facility. She stated they are applying for revenue bonds in the amount of \$250,000 - \$300,000 for equipment.

Reuber stated she has been staying busy in Public Health, finding services that can be provided without a nurse. Koster stated they are still actively trying to recruit a Public Health Nurse, but they coordinate with the Hoxie Medical Clinic for a nurse to go to Public Health for footcare, medication box filling, and baseline services. Immunizations are handled through the clinic. Koster advised the board that public health will stay where they are. There is no longer a plan to move Public Health up to a new area at the hospital.

Bird reviewed the expenses

and income for Public Health for 2021 and stated Sheridan County owed the hospital \$8,444.81. There was no discussion. Bracht advised Bird that she would need additional information for budget preparation.

Jason Weimer entered the meeting representing the Hoxie Golf Club. Weimer discussed the needs of the Hoxie Golf Club. The high school golf team uses the golf course and USD #412 pays the membership fees for the students. The Golf Club has tried to keep the green fees and membership fees low, but membership is declining. Weimer stated it is a city-owned golf course. There was discussion about county taxpayers paying taxes for a city golf course as people still talk about having to pay for the city swimming pool. The Board asked Weimer to get Bracht their most recent financial report. Weimer is requesting \$10,000. The City of Hoxie gave \$20,000 the first year and has given \$10,000 to-date this year. The Board stated they have just started working on the Budget so will discuss further once they start meeting with the auditor.

Wes Bainter made a motion to amend the Agenda to include Deb Kaufman, EMS Director. Joe Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0. Kaufman presented the Education Incentive Grant for an individual wanting to take the EMT class in Colby. The amount of the grant is \$1,150. Joe Bainter made a motion, seconded by Wes Bainter to approve the Education Incentive Grant. Carried 3-0

At 10:08, Joe Bainter made a motion to enter into executive session for a period of 15 minutes for the discussion of non-elected personnel. Mader seconded. Carried 3-0. Present were the Board, Kaufman, Bracht, and Pratt. At 10:24 the door opened and Mader made a motion to extend the executive session for a period of 10 minutes. Joe Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0. The door opened at 10:33. Joe Bainter made a motion to increase the EMS hourly weekday stipend to \$3.00/hr. and \$5.00/hr. stipend for weekend pay and to pay a flat rate of \$150.00 if an EMT carries pager for 24 consecutive hours on a weekend. Mader seconded. Carried 3-0. If EMT carries for 24 hours on a weekend, the hourly stipend ceases, but the EMT will be paid run pay if there is a run or transfer to another facility.

The following payroll was approved by the Board as presented:
