

Desiree Rexach of Goodland Tech will be in attendance to speak about Goodland Tech and introduce guest speaker Troy Cross, Fellow at the Bitcoin Policy Institute. Attendees will enjoy free refreshments provided by Goodland Tech.

Troy Cross is a Professor of Philosophy and Humanities at Reed College in Portland, Oregon, USA. He has formerly taught philosophy at Yale University and Oxford University. 



## Commission Minutes 12/6/22

Now on this 6<sup>th</sup> day of December 2022, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Wes Bainter presiding. Others present were Joe Bainter, Mike "Buck" Mader, County Attorney Joe Pratt and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were *The Sheridan Sentinel*, Kyle Ahlenstorf, and Agnes Winter.

At 8:00 a.m. Bainter called the meeting to order.

Those in attendance stood and recited the Pledge of

Allegiance. DeBoer, Penco Jerol Engineering, Justin Armknecht, City of Hoxie Superintendent, Kevin Schoendaler, Water Commissioner, Jim Erwin, Street Commissioner, and Darrick Zerr, City of Hoxie Mayor, came to the table to discuss road work from Sheridan Ave. at 9th Street to 10W. DeBoer stated the road hasn't been analyzed yet to see if there are any soft spots. Wes Bainter stated Scott Foote would like to run the asphalt south to his house at his expense. There was discussion about going just north of the cemetery. The maximum amount of money the County will receive from the state is \$500,000. DeBoer will come up with new estimates for the City and County. The Agreement with KDOT will be through the County and then the City and County will have an Agreement.

Joe Herskowitz and Evan Turley came to the table. Herskowitz asked DeBoer if the email received from the state with an application attached was something he had already completed (Local

Road Safety Plan) or if it was for something new. DeBoer stated since the application has been completed the County can do a project to replace all the signs. Penco Engineering can make application for this. Herskowitz will continue the conversation with DeBoer on this.

Work on Bridge #56 is continuing, and they are hoping for concrete shortly.

The Elk Ranch bridge needs material at each of the ends as it is settling. Road & Bridge will bring millings in. Wes Bainter stated again that they did an excellent job on that bridge. It was left better than it was found

Evan Turley presented the Agreement with KDOT to treat noxious weeds along state and federal highways during 2023. Mader made a motion to approve the Agreement, keeping the labor cost at \$27.50/hr., \$35.00/hr. when the 2016 Ford F550 is used and \$30.00/hr. for the Polaris Ranger. Wes Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Wes Bainter signed the document.

Bainter signed the document. Turley stated the prairie dogs are being treated and they are making headway. Turley presented a bid for a 2023 side-by-side from Better Built Trailers in the amount of \$23,200. Turley will check with some other dealerships about side-by-side. Herskowitz advised the Board they were hauling millings to several areas. Bracht advised the Board and Herskowitz that \$321,776.00 was spent on mowing, \$159,201.50 dragging and \$76,737.50 on road work. Wes Bainter stated mowing is a bargain, the County couldn't touch it for

At 8:51, Joe Bainter made a motion to enter into executive session for a period of five minutes for the discussion on non-elected personnel. Mader seconded. Carried 3-0. Present

were the Board and Bracht. The

door opened at 8:58.

Chad Koster, CFO, at Sheridan County Hospital entered the meeting. Koster presented a letter that the hospital would like the Commissioners to review and sign supporting the Sheridan County Hospital's standing as a public agency. The documentation will be given to County Attorney Pratt to review before signing. Koster distributed financial information for the hospital through October 31 and discussed a few items.

Koster stated the hospital budget will be approved at the December 19 meeting and that 2023 will be a tighter year.

There was a discussion about the flu, COVID, and RSV in the county and how it affects the hospital.

Three contractors were interviewed for the emergency room remodel project and all three came in significantly higher than anticipated. The hospital has taken a step back and will meet with the architect to see what is driving the increased cost. The initial estimate of the project was 2.5 million dollars.

A part-time Public Health nurse has been hired. She is there one day a week currently. Koster will have a Public Health Report the next time he comes. The Board would like to be kept informed of what is going on in that department.

County Attorney Joe Pratt stated that the woman who lives at Sheridan Estates has been in contact with Alice Ziegler about the Swap Shop. Agnes Winter was recognized. Winter gave a brief history of why the Swap Shop was started. Bracht will invite Borger, Ziegler, and Denise from Sheridan Estates to talk about plans. Pratt will talk with Leroy Wildeman.

Mader made a motion to approve the Treasurer Tax Abatements presented, seconded by Wes Bainter. Carried 3-0

Bracht advised the Board the Little Paws Daycare in Selden is eligible for \$50,000 from the ARPA funds as they requested. It would happen as a grant and Bracht would have to have documentation as to what and how the funds

were spent. Joe Bainter made a motion to approve giving Little Paws Daycare \$50,000 from the ARPA funds, seconded by Wes Bainter. Carried 3-0

There was a brief discussion about the remaining ARPA

Joe Bainter made a motion, seconded by Mader, to renew Sheridan County's membership with Western Prairie RC&D at a cost of \$500. Carried 3-0

Joe Bainter brought up the "Y" road east of Selden. Joe Bainter stated he feels like it has been overlooked. There are decisions being made to redo roads in Hoxie but nothing in Selden. Wes Bainter stated he had received calls that it is faster to not use the "Y".

Mader made a motion to approve the December 2, 2022 Payroll as presented. Joe Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0



Roth said," It didn't go how we wanted to, but we still got good experience and got to participate."



Every senior going on to school in the 9 counties of northwest Kansas need to complete the Pete Henry Scholarship. It can be used to support education in most settings. Find the application at <a href="mailto:petehenryfoundation.com">petehenryfoundation.com</a>. There is a separate form to use if you are going to a technical school, so watch for that.

It is not due until February 1, and you will need a 7-semester transcript, so you cannot complete it now. But you can start and make sure you do not throw it together at the last minute.

Beginning academic year 2023-24, students interested in participating in the Hansen Scholarship test (in September) must now have an ACT composite score of 23 or higher. This is the composite score from one test, superscores are not accepted. The cumulative GPA requirement of a 3.50 or better has not changed.

TWIST, or Teen Women in Science and Technology, is a one-day conference to expose teens across the state to various career possibilities. TWIST is open to anyone in ninth through 12th grade. Students must register individually and choose their top 5 career sessions. It will be held Thursday, Jan. 5 at K-State Salina. Check-in begins at 8:30 a.m.

Student career sessions are available in Accounting, Architecture, Aviation, Business, Civic Leadership, Engineering, Holistic Wellness, Law/Law Enforcement, Marketing, Non-Profit Administration, and Realty

Several area schools, with Golden Plains being the farthest to the west, can have students apply for the Katherine Brungardt Scholarship. See your counselor for a copy. It is due on March 3, and the donors would love to see some applicants for technical schools.

The Jayhawk Battalion of Army ROTC at KU has a scholarship opportunity. The next scholarship board deadline for submission is 16 January 2023. For students to be considered "board ready", they will have to complete their applications, which does have essays, download their Transcripts, SAT/ACT scores, do a PT Test with a school administrator or coach, and finally have an interview with a Professor of Military Science of their choice (we are happy to do in-person and via ZOOM).

When this is complete, students can compete for and earn either a 3-year or 4-year scholarship. Keep in mind, ALL Army ROTC covers FULL tuition and fees OR up to \$10K/year for Room and Board. Once contracted, they will enjoy a tax-free monthly stipend of \$420.00 for 10 months of the school year, and \$1200.00 annually for books. Minutes of the Regular Meeting of November 14, 2022






